How would you behave if you suddenly found yourself in the presence of the Queen? If I were to meet the Queen, I would probably act differently to the way I act when meeting other people. So if I was to have tea with the Queen, although I hate to admit it, I'm certain I would suddenly become incredibly aware of my table manners, a topic which doesn't normally concern me in the least.

We're all a bit of a mixture. In fact, we sometimes refer to people who are very confident and happy with themselves as being "together", as though they have the different aspects of their personality in some kind of unity. And perhaps this is the aim of all of us - that we should be so happy and confident within ourselves that we never find ourselves slipping into a different mode with different people.

Jesus was like this. He treated everyone, from the highest Roman official to the lowliest beggar, exactly the same, with no thought at all for the consequences. He was the most "together" person it's possible to be.

But perhaps most of us are a bit like Legion, the man with multiple personalities whom Jesus healed, (see Luke 8:27-35). With Legion, the difference in the many personalities he displayed was exaggerated to such an extent that he seemed like a whole host of different people. He was regarded as quite mad and very dangerous, hence he was banished to live in total isolation amongst the tombs.

Legion was fragmented within himself, and this is a common experience today, although thankfully not usually to the point of madness as experienced by Legion. Sadly, I believe that individual fragmentation is symbolic of the larger fragmentation of society which is so apparent here in the West today. We are separated from each other in so many ways; through religion, race, age, gender, ability, money, and so on. And now we've added social media into the mix, which seems to bring another level of stress! This all shows that we're living more and more in an individualistic age, where we're encouraged to think only of ourselves. We're bombarded by the sort of advertising which constantly exhorts us to get more for ourselves and to beautify ourselves and make ourselves appear younger and so on.

Even our religion has become individual to a large extent. There's much more room for individual thought, which is probably a good thing, but if taken to its logical extremes, that could mean "anything goes". The worrying side of this individualistic religion is that people don't meet together for worship anything like as much as once they did.

Many people hold the opinion that "you don't have to go to church to be a Christian", but I think they're confusing living a good life, with Christianity. You certainly don't have to go to church to live a good life, but Christianity is a community faith in which members love each other, and that can't be achieved without those members meeting together. And the emptier our churches become, the emptier our faith becomes.

Christianity isn't a faith of lots of individuals, it's a faith of people coming together because it's based on community and loving one another. You can't love somebody you never meet. As Jesus said when he was challenged on something very like this issue, *"If you don't love your brother whom you do see, how can you possibly love God whom you don't see?"* 

St Paul in his letter to the Galatians went even further. He said that all of us are one in Christ Jesus, which he expanded by saying that because we are all children of God through faith, there is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female. The Church, the body of Christ, should no longer be fragmented as if we were Legion, but should be united, as Christ is united within himself and to His heavenly Father. God's plan is that we see ourselves as all equal within the Church, through faith in Jesus Christ. This then helps us to live holy and righteous lives for God, based on His good, honest, healthy and loving character and with Christ directing and guiding us in everything we do.

Unfortunately, what the Church actually displays to the world is much more Legion-like than Christ-like. We are actually fragmented almost to the point of madness, and the result of that fragmentation is that we tend to live not basking within the healing warmth of God's love and life, but dying amongst the tombs, which are lonely desolate places where death is thick in the air.

If we want God's kingdom to come in this world, the Church must begin to ditch its suspicion and uncertainty of each other and begin to take the risk of accepting all Christians as equal, no matter how strange other people's worship may seem to us.

As the Church, the body of Christ, we always need to be prepared to reach out to all people, regardless of their relationship with God, with acceptance and love. As St Paul said, we must begin to ignore status and gender and race and colour and individual preference in order to become united within ourselves, within the body of Christ's Church. For its only when we're truly united, despite our differences of opinion and worship, and when we truly love one another, that Legion will become truly healed for all time.



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


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

# JULY REPORT – Leeann Jackson-Eve (Clerk)

Five councillors were present with apologies from Des Bavington-Lowe. There are still three vacancies on the Parish Council so please give joining the Parish Council some consideration.

**Public Forum:** There were two members of the public present at the meeting. Peter Beck, the Neighbourhood Watch coordinator, reports that there will be a "summer safety" article in this parish magazine.

**Planning:** There was one planning application for works to convert Shop 2 at Chilvers, Market Place to a café. This was supported by the Parish Council.

Neighbourhood Plan: The Plan is still with the Examiner so it's looking like a referendum will take place in early Autumn. You can find more information on the current state of the Plan in an article in this magazine.

**Play Area Consultation:** We had a great response to the initial consultation and we thank everyone for their input. The results are being turned into draft designs and we hope to get some more feedback from you once those are available.

**Back Hills One-Way?** We've had a request from a resident to turn Back Hills one-way from The Drift to the B1113 due to traffic issues at peak times. The PC doesn't necessarily support this solution but has asked SCC for advice on it and other ways to resolve the problem.

We are looking for an organised Poppy Appeal team, to deliver the Poppy Appeal in BOTESDALE.


This year's annual appeal will take place from 26TH October - 11<sup>th</sup> November 2019.

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

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# Redgrave Parish Council



#### Redgrave July Report – by the Clerk

All seven councillors were present at the meeting. There are currently two vacancies on the Parish Council, so please get in touch if you are interested in becoming a councillor.

Public Forum: County/District Cllr Jessica Fleming was present to give a report. In County news: Highways England is planning to close the A14 in whole or part between J51 (Beacon Hill) and J43 (Bury) at night (8.00 pm – 6.00 am) Mondays – Fridays as follows (to be confirmed): Eastbound A14 will be closed between 8<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> July and westbound A14 will be closed between 29<sup>th</sup> July and 16<sup>th</sup> August. The official HGV diversion route uses the A143 and A140. The roll-out of superfast **broadband** continues. If you haven't yet received it, you can check your area at www.betterbroadbandsuffolk.com/upgrade-now. **Pothole Repair Criteria Changing** – You will be pleased to learn that a trial scheme in Ipswich to reassess how potholes are categorised for repair will be applied across Suffolk starting this summer. The new system allows engineers to repair potholes close to each other during the same visit, tackling smaller potholes before they can expand.

#### District news:

New Waste Collection Days - The majority of Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils' residents will be given a Black and Green new bin collection day commencing on week of 15th July in order to adapt to changes in settlement patterns and new development. Individual notices should be received this week. Brown bin collection will not be affected. For any questions, contact the waste team on 0300 1234000, option 4 or visit https://www.babergh.gov.uk/waste-services/ Local Plan Consultation Draft - Over the past year Mid Suffolk has received numerous responses to its call for new residential and commercial development sites. The August 2017 Draft Joint Local Plan has been updated to reflect current national policies (February 2019 National Planning Policy Framework) and the new version was approved for public consultation at the 27th June Council meeting, the consultation period will last 10 weeks, commencing shortly. Please refer to the new I Draft JLP Homepage: https://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/planning/planningpolicy/new-joint-local-plan/.

The Tree Warden reported that the new "tree group" has ordered 150 trees to plant in the village. The Parish Council is supporting this by allowing planting on parish-owned land on Fen Street (the "town pit"). The planting will take place in October/November so there is still time to get involved (contact John Preston on 890974). The Tree Group is also looking at how it can involve the school.

**Planning:** There were no new planning applications, but the PC was very pleased to note that the planning appeal has been dismissed for the 30 proposed houses on land at Gallows Hill.

The PC discussed the new draft Joint Local Plan (see above) and has been advised by District Cllr Fleming to contact MSDC with any

immediate objections prior to the official consultation. The PC has since put in an objection to the inclusion of the proposed development at the southern end of Hall Lane in the new settlement boundary and requested the inclusion of the Old School Playing Field. When the public consultation begins, the PC will submit a full response.

**Neighbourhood Plan:** The NHP Committee has developed a questionnaire for the village and this will be launched from a stand at the Redgrave ShakesBeer Festival. Following that they will be delivered to your door and subsequently collected. They will also be online or available for access through a QR code for the technologically advanced! The NHP Committee has applied for a grant of £5,800 for the first year and this will go towards the cost of the consultant who will be helping the Committee write the Plan.

**Entrance Gateways:** The PC has clarified that it would have responsibility for public liability, upkeep and repair of the gates, with an additional insurance cost of £24.37 per annum, and has therefore agreed to go ahead with the scheme.

**Grass Cutting:** As reported in the last parish magazine, there is a new Highways Self Help Scheme that enables parish councils to do some of the work Suffolk County Council can no longer fund. Unfortunately, the scheme has highlighted that parish councils cannot legally work on the highway, including the verges (about 1.5 metres in), without specific training and supervision. You may have noticed a delay in getting The Knoll cut as a result. We are trying to clarify the parish council's position and would ask you to be patient. Please note that SCC is still responsible for cutting verges!

**Correspondence:** The PC has received an offer for purchase of part of the Old School Playing Field from an adjoining resident. This will not be taken up while the access right of way is being established.

# **Correspondence:**

**MSDC**: The new Draft Joint Local Plan will be going out to public consultation later this summer.

RBR Parochial Church Council (PCC): There

is now a new Church Warden, Kit Brinkley. **Resident:** The PC has agreed to request "pedestrians crossing" signs on A143 near the footpath crossings.

# **General Items:**

**Reserves Policy:** The PC has adopted a policy which gives guidelines on the level and use of financial reserves. Recommended levels of general reserves are roughly 50% of annual expenditure and the PC has a small shortfall to make up.

**Village Hall Skate Park:** The PC has agreed to support the VH Management Committee skate park development by providing funds and helping obtain funding from outside bodies. PC will consider using Community Infrastructure Levy funds from local development. Initially contributing 10% and capped at £4000. The PC would like to encourage parishioners to suggest other infrastructure projects within the village that the CIL Money could be used for if you do not support this use.

**Waste Collection**: Rickinghall residents have new Black and Green bin collection dates commencing week beginning 15<sup>th</sup> July. Brown bin collections will not be affected. Any questions contact 03001234000, option 4 or visit the councils' website.

However, should you wish to provide your urine specimen in your own container, please ensure this is a clean but not glass container. Your clinician will return your container to you for you to take home to dispose or clean & reuse on another occasion"

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

Scott, Amundsen and the Race to the Pole - Robert Burridge

Robert Burridge gave a very detailed and interesting account of the conditions in Antarctica, the personalities of both Scott and Amundsen and how they approached their prospective expeditions when he spoke to the

June meeting of the Heritage Circle. He explained that Antarctica is the fifth largest continent. It is uninhabited as it is so cold as the temperature drops to -60°F, and has been known to drop to -126°F. It has 90% of the world's snow and experiences 200mph gales.

Robert Scott was appointed by the Royal Geographical Society to lead the Terra Nova expedition to the South Pole. At the time, the British attitude toward expeditions was both amateurish and arrogant. There was a common belief that the qualities required of explorers were innate. As a consequence he was ill-prepared; Scott knew very little about the weather conditions and the terrain of the Antarctic. His provisions, equipment and clothing were woefully inadequate. He did not take into account that the team would need a high protein/fat diet, along with fresh fruit and vegetables in order to sustain them and to prevent scurvy. They needed a daily intake of 6,000 calories in order to cope with the extreme conditions. In addition, the group was often dehydrated.

Similarly, Scott's expedition faced further difficulties. His ship, The Discovery, was not built to sail through ice and developed various problems during the journey. He chose to take ponies which were ill suited to the Antarctic. His motorised sledges were heavy and did not function well in the extreme cold. His team was not trained to use skis which made their journey even more arduous. The depots of supplies that his team left for the return journey were never found because the markers were inadequate.

Sadly, Scott was not a good leader. He did not create a positive team spirit. He could be indecisive as he did not consult or include others in decision making. His team became resentful. This was compounded by Scott's character as he tended to be humourless and a loner. He had poor navigational skills and certainly did not understand the psychology of living in the Arctic.

Scott's rival in the 'Race to the Pole,' the Norwegian Roald Amundsen, arrived at the South Pole on 15 December 1911, a month before Scott. His team was able to cover 40 miles in 9 hours, a distance which took Scott a week. Before he left for the expedition, Amundsen prepared carefully as he went to the North Pole to learn about the currents in Arctic Sea and lived with Eskimos who taught him survival skills. He learnt to ski. He built light sledges and coated the runners with ice and moss so that they glided more easily. He took dogs to pull sledges. He also understood the importance of diet and took whale meat, caribou, and animal fat as well as fresh fruit and vegetables. By contrast, Scott took tinned meat, crackers, cheese and port. His ship was built to move through the ice. Amundsen read everything he could on Antarctica as well as studying aspects of leadership. He promoted autonomy and independence. He took responsibility for his actions and understood the psychology of living in extreme cold and darkness, and resolving the tensions created when being in a group together for long periods of time.

Tragically, Scott and his team perished and were buried where they died. A cross was erected in their memory. His expedition was regarded as a heroic failure. Similarly, Amundsen is considered to be a hero in Norway. He died in 1928 flying on a rescue mission that disappeared in the Barents Sea.

# The Botesdale & Rickinghall Neighbourhood Plan --- Status and "the Bigger Picture" ---



# The Neighbourhood Plan for Botesdale and Rickinghall is nearly complete

**Much has been learned** about the way residents can influence the future of our villages within the legallybinding planning guidelines - known as *Local Plans* for all the districts around the UK. Also, about how the Neighbourhood Plan must remain consistent with the relevant *Local Plan*.

**Local Plans** are built by our District Council Planning Teams based on Government guidelines (the *National Planning Policy Framework*). They address housing, economy, infrastructure and the environment. Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils have together been working on a *Joint Local Plan* which is, or soon will be, open for consultation - again, YOUR views matter, so look out for this consultation opportunity.

**Our Neighbourhood Plan** is now being checked (by "The Examiner") to make sure it is indeed consistent with the existing *Local Plan* - that's the one in force until the *Joint Local Plan* replaces it some time next year. Our Neighbourhood Plan is not set in stone - it can be reviewed from time to time as residents see the need to do so.

**The Joint Local Plan** determines *strategic* planning, with the Neighbourhood Plan providing *details* that relate to our community's wishes. This provides guidelines to be adhered to by those who may want to change our villages in any way - for example the *types* of houses that are built, such that they do not disrupt local vernacular.

**Thank you** for your help in bringing us to this stage with your participation in meetings, surveys and discussions. The inclusion of your views has strengthened the Neighbourhood Plan, and has given the Steering Group confidence that the Plan is well worthwhile.

**Your final task** will be to vote for or against the Neighbourhood Plan in a Referendum later this year. We'll keep you posted about this.

# Why did you start to write?

This was a question I was asked a little while ago, and at the time could not provide a satisfactory answer to it. On reflection, it had to be an experience that triggered the desire to write.

In 2003 I was living in Abu Dhabi with my late wife. At lunch with good friends one day we agreed that we should take a few days holiday as it was spring time, and visit a small town called Khasab in Oman. It was quite a long drive through Dubai, Sharjah, Ajman, Um al Quain and over the border crossing at Ras Al Khaimah into Oman. From the border to Khasab took about another thirty minutes.

Of course the "What shall we do?" had to be answered. Apart from visiting the fort and the harbour (a story for another day), one opportunity was a day long dhow trip to Telegraph Island in the Elphinstone Inlet (Khor As Sham) and when we booked we were given a small printed description of it. We discovered that the island had it's name because in about 1850 it was the location of a Repeater Station on the first telegraph cable to India. We found also that the people who operated the telegraph were British and they lived in tents or Barasti huts without benefit of the air conditioning that we find essential these days. Water and food had to be supplied by ship. Mental problems occurred due to the isolation and those affected had to be taken away by sea. I believe this spawned the phrase "Gone round the bend" as the island is just past a bend in the inlet.

The island is simply the small barren top of a submerged mountain (the masonry is what remains of World War fortifications), and after I disembarked from the dhow I sat down on the island to think about what I had learnt. It wasn't hot, and I could not believe that the telegraphers were able to function day in, day out, in the heat of an Arabian summer.

I felt there was a story to be told about Telegraph Island, and with my late wife's encouragement, I wrote it.

If anyone has planted young oak trees recently that might have been imported from the continent, there is an important health check to be made. This applies to trees with a girth of more than 8cm at 1.2m above the root collar.

Oak Tree Alert

Check your trees for Oak Processionary Moth caterpillars (OPM). This pest has to be taken seriously but do not try to do it yourself. Especially do not touch the caterpillars as they pose a risk to human health. You should report any sightings to the online portal:

#### Rickinghall Inferior Church Needs Friends

Recently, Notre Dame caught fire and initially it was thought that it would be destroyed completely. The media showed pictures of people standing around watching the fire. They were in a state of shock, many people in tears when they spoke about it. Most of the cathedral, fortunately, was saved much to the world's relief.

Mary's St Rickinghall Inferior disappeared, the whole world would not be upset but local people would miss seeing it as they drive into the village, and sometimes use it. The lower part of the round tower is probably at least one century older than Notre Dame.

This church needs your help, the congregation at Rickinghall Church is small, with many elderly people. Would you be interested in Joining a Friends of Rickinghall Church? You do not have to be a church goer to join a Friends Group. Maybe you are interested in old buildings or have family connections with ancestors buried in the churchyard, married in the church or baptised in the font. We need help in two different ways; one financially to help pay for work to be carried out, and offers of physical help to maintain the church and churchyard. Wortham Church have a very active Friends group who organised a Victorian Flower Festival and concert over a weekend in June which raised in the region of £3,000. Apart from the money raised, many people enjoyed the event as a community. This was thanks to a team who worked very hard to achieve this. Wortham church warden told me she does not know what the church would do without the help of the Friends Group. Bardwell has a group who recently organised an open gardens weekend and Palgrave's Friends held a concert one evening with a plant stall the next day. If you cannot help physically, Friends Groups usually have a subscription scheme.


Every five years Church of England churches are required to have a Quinquennial Inspection by a qualified Architect. Rickinghall Inferior Church had one in 2018. The major part of the work needed for St. Mary's is to the north side of the chancel roof, and drainage and guttering problems, with a guessed total budget of just under £80,000.

A review was carried out of the state of English church buildings called the Taylor Review and as a result a pilot scheme is being carried out for eighteen months in two areas, Greater Manchester and the County of Suffolk giving minor repairs grants to listed places of worship. Although it will not cover re-roofing it can be given towards drains and gutters and we have been awarded a grant of £5,640 towards the expenses of building works due to be carried out in September/October for a small part of the QI repairs needed. Further grants will be requested for the remainder of the repairs but the church has to make contributions also.

The Taylor Review Pilot grant is being given by Historic England and funded by the Department for Culture Media and Sport. The government do not usually help with any funding for church buildings. To obtain this grant the PCC has had to sign a contract to maintain the church for the next six years with annual inspections to be carried out. The Taylor Review Pilot allocated

two support officers for Suffolk, one who has been advising on the buildings and helping with the grant and one trying to encourage communal activity in the villages. Laura Emmins is the Community Development Officer and she will be coming to Rickinghall Church on Saturday morning 2<sup>nd</sup> November at 10 am to give advice on starting a Friends Group. If you are interested please would you contact me on the above number. Fundraising can be a rewarding experience in itself. Several of us had a lot of laughs raising  $\pounds 30,000$  in 2010/11 for the 2008 QI, even if it was hard work.

Rickinghall Inferior Church is grade 1 listed, the highest category of listing. This is not the first time the church has requested help from the village people. The south aisle of the church was re-dedicated as a

Lady Chapel in 1962, and Friends raised the money for this. The lower church (Rickinghall Inferior) was due to be closed in the 1970s but an appeal went out in opposition to the Rector, Rev. Leslie Welton and the Upper Church (Rickinghall Superior) was made redundant in 1977 instead of Rickinghall Inferior. The nave roof was replaced at Rickinghall Inferior in the 1970s.

An appeal went out for help to raise £25,000 for repairs needed from 1980-1985 by The Friends of St. Mary's Rickinghall Inferior and funds were raised.

Jeff Lamb has been the only churchwarden for two years, trying to look after three churchyards amongst all his other duties. Jeff has now taken well-earned retirement as churchwarden and there is no one person to take his place. Help in the churchyard would be much appreciated. We have one very good volunteer who regularly cuts round the cremation area and paths for



which we are very grateful and many people keep their own relatives' graves neat and tidy. It can be very peaceful weeding the flowerbeds in the churchyard, and the traffic from the main road is hardly noticed. A

friendly Robin waits for worms in the cremation area. The path through the churchyard is used by many people as it is a designated public footpath.

Over the next few months there will be a few events held for the church fabric fund. Sarah Doig has organised a concert on Saturday evening, 10th August at 6pm, a talk by Tim Holt-Wilson on Redgrave Hall and Park on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> October, Quiz and Fish and Chip Supper evening Friday 28<sup>th</sup> February, 2020, and a talk by Roy Tricker on the history of Rickinghall Inferior Church on 15<sup>th</sup> May. 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# Exploring the Past Again

#### Memories

Last month I wrote about memories of earlier times being written down, or recorded, for people in the future. In the next few parish articles I am hoping to include memories, that have already been written, about our villages in the early decades of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

We would love to have your memories. These need not be essays but could be noted down as answers to questions such as: What do you remember about your family? Where did you live? Where did you go to school?

In the late 1980s Peggy Healey née Fellingham replied to the following questions which had been asked by her grandson Ewan for a school project. Ewan was six years old at the time. The first five are below and the rest will appear in next month's Parish Magazine.

## In what year were you six years old?

I was born in 1924 so that would be 1930

#### Where did you live?

I lived, and still do so, in a small village called Rickinghall in the county of Suffolk, two miles from the Norfolk border where, in the village of Redgrave, the River Waveney and the Little Ouse River rise under the road, the Waveney going east and the Little Ouse going west.

These two rivers divide Norfolk from Suffolk. Rickinghall is divided into two parts; Rickinghall Superior and Rickinghall inferior. The boundary line is very complicated, sometimes going down the middle of the road and going between houses. In one or two places it actually goes through the houses. It made the old rating system very complicated. There were even two churches but one is now redundant. Rickinghall is also adjoined to the village of Botesdale. When I was six years old it was just one long street.

#### How large was your family?

Ours was a small family; mother (Rosetta Fellingham, née Musk) and father (Frederick Fellingham), my brother (Fred) and myself.

#### What was your house like?

We lived on the end of a terrace of four cottages (now Glenfield), ours being much the largest as there was an integral sweet shop, with bedrooms above. They were about one hundred years old. The kitchen was about nine feet by nine feet, with a walk in pantry nine feet by five feet. There was a Dutch oven in the wall and also a copper for wash days, both heated by sticks and coal, one sink, also an open coaled fire.

There was one living room downstairs about thirteen feet by thirteen feet with an open coaled fire. The shop was about twenty two feet by ten feet. Upstairs was a sitting room, or lounge as it would be called today, and three bedrooms. The toilet was outside as they all were in those days in the villages. There was no electricity; everybody used oil lamps.

#### Where did you go to school and what was it like?

I went to school at the church school in Rickinghall. It was very strict! There were about one hundred to one hundred and twenty pupils on average. Every morning the number of children present was chalked up on a board hanging in the hall. This was done before morning assembly. After assembly we all went back to our classrooms. When I was six years old there were four teachers but as the years went by pupil numbers dropped so the staff was cut down to three teachers.

Each classroom had a large open coaled fire with an iron guard round it. If your desk happened to be near it in the winter you roasted. Those further away were not so lucky; it was very cold at the other end of the room.

A small room just off the hall was used for storing games equipment etcetera. It was also where the Horlicks malted milk was heated in winter for the children during morning playtime. You were able to buy a mug every morning for threepence a week. In later years school milk was introduced. The room was also used by the school doctor and nurse.

There were two playgrounds, one for the boys and one for the girls. The toilets were outside on one side of the playground. Lessons started at nine o'clock until twelve and in the afternoon from one thirty until four o'clock. In winter, school ended at three forty. The infant class always went home at three thirty.

Some pupils lived quite a long way from the village, many cycling up to three miles, not very good in wet weather. There were no facilities to dry clothes. There were no school dinners in those days. If you lived near enough to the school you went home to dinner. Pupils living outside the village brought sandwiches which they ate in the classroom.


As the teachers all went home to dinner there was no supervision during the dinner time. I don't remember there being much unruliness, the threat of the cane was quite a deterrent. It was used for any bad behaviour or misconduct. Also in those days anyone being caned at school got into more trouble with their parents when they arrived home for being a nuisance to the teachers. We had various head teachers over the years and quite a number of different assistant teachers.

Lessons were as follows: After morning assembly we had mental arithmetic; anyone with more than three wrong stayed in at playtime. Next came the main maths lesson. By then it was morning break. Usually the next lesson was English or we had to write an essay. Then it was dinner time. Afternoon lessons mostly consisted of history, geography, reading, two art lessons a week. Knitting and sewing were also taught.

Games lessons: football and cricket for the boys, netball or shinty for the girls. Sometimes we played against another village school which was quite an event. We had exams at the end of every term.

It is not a result of thinking it out but simply succumbing to peer pressure. Those attitudes will, more often than not, stay with that person for the rest of their lives. What a way to determine the things of eternity.

If I wish to present Christianity to someone these days their eyes will glaze over with them simply waiting for me to finish. It isn't that they have long thought out the counter -arguments and are bored with the subject but that the idea of even contemplating Christianity is alien to them. I find it difficult to put it into words but somehow their minds never begin to engage. It is as if there is a reject process in action before any normal mental rejection process takes place. It isn't a matter of "This is nonsense therefore I will not listen." There is no "therefore," just, "I do not listen." This is largely down to peer pressure, not necessarily at school but the pressure of modern secular society. They are not personal views but societal views.

To be an atheist needs faith, faith in the fact that there is no God and thus no judgement for what we do, neither is there heaven and hell. Atheists have faith in their own opinion. They are banking on death being simply the end of existence. The Christian has faith in the fact that there is a God and there is heaven and hell and that there is a way of forgiveness through Jesus. If the atheist is right and death is the end of existence then no one has anything to fear neither the atheist or the Christian. If the Christian is right the atheist will be in very deep trouble.

Another way of saying what I was trying to say above is that it seems to me that a large proportion of the population of 21<sup>st</sup> century Britain have no faith at all, not even the faith of an atheist.

There have been many new bird sounds recently; several young birds squeaking for parental feeding, pathetic sounds and behaviour before disappearing into the nearest cover, followed by a parent with a beak full of food. In the past one would have heard a parent Thrush crushing a snail on a stone, now sadly no Thrushes—at least, not in my garden.

It was good to learn that Spotted Flycatchers had returned to their usual site in Redgrave. Year after year I get reports from this site. Sometimes with two broods. I have been there when the youngsters from the first brood mix with the second brood. The neighbouring field had several sheep which encouraged the flies to keep coming and was food for the family. Redgrave and Rickinghall Inferior churchyards have been sites in previous years for Flycatchers, with the parent birds flying to and fro from their favourite gravestones to catch their meals.

The last of our migratory arrivals will be the Nightjarsby day well camouflaged when sitting on their ground nests, but coming out at night. Because they are darkcoloured birds, they blend with the night. The observer may, with luck, see a few white feathers in their plumage. But the main attraction about the Nightiar 'churrina'. is its SO characteristic of a warm summer's night. Years ago I have heard and seen them



on Knettishall Heath, but now no more, probably put off by the increase in visitors and their dogs. I well remember a group visit to the Heath for the 'churring'. Two of us heard a 'churring' but it was too high-pitched and we both agreed it was a Grasshopper Warbler. Now I fear my hearing may not pick up these sounds. Two years ago I received an urgent call to Wortham Ling and there was a lone Nightjar seen as well as heard. Perhaps, like our occasional 'booming' Bittern on the Fen, it was 'churring' for a mate. If one occurred in either case, its 'job done' and the singing ('booming' or 'churring'), stops.

I visited Dunwich Heath one day this summer. A brilliant view of Sole Bay from the top of the cliff ( but a cool easterly wind off the sea). Sand Martins were flying around us. Apparently below us on the Minsmere Reserve an Iberian Chiff Chaff had appeared, a very rare sighting indeed. This was Suffolk's third visit ever. Only its song is its distinguishing feature from our Chiff Chaff. It is interesting how some birds can only be distinguished by their song e.g. Marsh and Willow Tits, Chiff Chaffs and Willow Warblers. Another rare warbler has again appeared at Minsmere, a Savis Warbler—looks like a Reed Warbler, but has a very individual song—a 'churring' similar to the Grasshopper Warbler, but lower, and whilst singing rotates its body causing a ventriloquistic effect.

However, I did get a call from another observer of a Turtle Dove in their garden. I visited. There were two (apparently occasionally three) birds present. AND I heard its 'churring' call. It 'made' both my day, and my monthly Bill's Birds.

Its summer which often means getting outside for a BBQ! Rather than buy them why not have a bash and your own burgers-this is a great recipe for a spicy burger!

### DIY Burger

Makes about 8 burgers Ingredients:

- 1kg Minced steak—the best quality you can get
- 1 onion-peeled and finely chopped
- Olive oil •
- Spices—a few crushed cumin seeds and a couple of teaspoons of coriander
- Sea salt and ground black pepper

- 1 tablespoon English Mustard
- 1 egg
- 120g breadcrumbs
- 75-100g parmesan cheese—grated
- Burger buns of your choice
- 1. Cook the onion in a frying pan for 5 mins until softened but not browned.
- 2. Put the minced steak in a bowl and add the cooked onion. Mix up the spices, salt and pepper and add to the meat.
- 3. Add the parmesan cheese, mustard and egg and then add half the breadcrumbs. Mix well. Add breadcrumbs if too sticky
- 4. Put greaseproof paper on a baking tray and sprinkle with some of remaining breadcrumbs.
- Shape the burger mix into 8 flat shaped burgers and 5. place on the tray—sprinkle the remaining breacrumbs on the top.
- 6. Ideally put in the fridge until ready to cook—and then fry them in a little oil for about 8-10 minutes.
- 7. Serve on or in your burger buns, perhaps with some hand-cut chips or potato wedges, and of course a bit of salad to be healthy!

Many thanks to the Starwing Brewery Team for allowing us to be there and share the experience!


### **Good News on Funding**

# Literary Suffolk

School holidays are upon us, allowing an opportunity to reflect on how Suffolk has been an inspiration to writers and poets over the years.

**Charles Dickens** was a regular visitor to Suffolk, which features in several novels: **David Copperfield**— the character was born in 'Blunderstone' and Dickens is thought to have got the idea from a signpost seen on a 1848 walking holiday from Lowestoft to Yarmouth. Much of the novel is set in the latter Norfolk town!

The Pickwick Papers— The corrupt, rotten borough of Eatanswill is thought to have been inspired by Ipswich or Sudbury. Dickens stayed in Bury St Edmunds in 1835 while reporting on the corrupt elections in Sudbury. **Oliver Twist**—Barham is one of the workhouses with a claim to have been the basis of Charles Dickens' story Oliver Twist. Dickens is said to have been shown around the workhouse on a visit to Suffolk and to have seen a record book containing the details of a ten-year-old boy's apprenticeship.

**George Orwell's** real name was Eric Arthur Blair, and went to school in Southwold and later lived in the town. He adopted the surname Orwell, inspired by the River Orwell.

Suffolk is thought to be referenced in several Shakespeare's plays:

In "**Henry VIII**", Ipswich School can possibly claim to be the only school mentioned in Shakespeare. Griffith says of Cardinal Wolsey: "Those twins Of learning that he raised in you, Ipswich and Oxford! one of which fell with him".

In "**Henry VII, Part II**", Shakespeare depicts the – alleged – murder of Duke Humphrey at Bury St Edmunds. "Run to my Lord of Suffolk; let him know

We have dispatch'd the duke, as he commanded."

"**Cymbeline**" is thought by some to be based upon Cunobelin, an ancient ruler of South Suffolk and North Essex.

Ruth Rendell – who once lived in Polstead – features Suffolk in many of her crime novels. For example, "A Fatal Inversion" features Polstead and Nayland, "Gallowglass" is set in Sudbury, "The Brimstone Wedding" in Bury St Edmunds and "No Night is Too Long" in Aldeburgh and Orford. Coincidentally, Polstead was the scene of the infamous Victorian Murder in the Red Barn .

**PD James** lived in Southwold and set some of her novesl in Suffolk, including Death in Holy Orders.

**Arthur Ramsome** moved to Suffolk to be nearer the sea, and moored his yacht, the Nancy Blackett at Pin Mill on the Shotley Peninsula.

### **School transition**






