Foreword from Revd Chris Norburn Rector of Redgrave cum Botesdale with the Rickinghalls

What's the most complicated thing that has been explained to you? A little while ago I was with a group of clergy and someone tried to explain quantum physics to us! He knew we were clergy but he tried his best to explain so that we could all understand. I'm none the wiser!!

Despite the best efforts of a worldwide pandemic today we are encouraged to remember those who have given their lives in conflict from the Great War to the present day. But it is so difficult to make sense of war in our own minds. It's hard to understand how the world seems to get itself into such terrible situations time and time again. So in one sense war is a bit like quantum physics – not easy to understand why it happens.

The prophet Micah, the author of an Old Testament Book in the Bible that carries his name, understood the complexities of war and the battle front. He had seen first hand what the mighty Assyrians could do to the Northern Kingdom of Israel and how they had threatened Jerusalem in the Southern Kingdom: he was prophesying in the midst of war and the constant threat of further invasion!

In Chapter 4 we find a wonderful theme: one day there will be peace on earth and righteousness will reign. Mt. Zion, what can be considered to be Jerusalem, will become the capital of the world; all the armies will be dismissed and the weapons destroyed. How can this happen?

Well reading on to Chapter 5 we see that this will happen when The Deliverer will come. The Deliverer is of course Jesus Christ and He has already come, but He will return and when He does He will establish His kingdom of peace and there shall be no more war. And because Christ has already been He makes available for all to have peace in their hearts by trusting Him as their Saviour (Rom. 5:1), for He came to save. And this is part of Micah's message: for people to make their decision to trust the Lord and obey Him.

The world has always hungered for peace. Every great empire has wanted peace. But history shows us that it comes at a cost for there seems to be a pattern: religion and worship of the emperor came first, followed by violence and war. When victory was established peace ensued, but it was often maintained through oppression, fear and more violence.

This four-fold model of how to obtain peace on earth is one which seems to be the model for many of our current day unrest. But as we read through the New Testament, especially Paul's letters, we see a common thread: that of equality and justice, because as Christians we are all equal in the community of God. So there can only be peace in God's world when there is a fair, just and equitable share of the benefits of the world. As this is God's plan those in authority in the world have the great responsibility to ensure an equitable share. God's model for peace is totally different to the world's. It is based upon first acknowledging him as Father, followed by non-violence and the establishment of justice and equality for all, and then peace will follow.

So God's model for peace is completely different to the world's: a peace which doesn't have to be maintained by force, fear or oppression. This could be seen by some as simplistic, as in trying to explain quantum physics in 45 minutes to clergy! That may well be so, and some would argue that force is necessary to ensure a fair and equitable distribution of resources, to bring about and maintain justice. And that too may be so. But we need to look behind our words and rhetoric and understand our true motives and objectives.

And so, as we remember those who have fallen and the many more who suffered and are still suffering, I believe that it is right to do so with a sense of thankfulness and respect. But for many there is a sense of the great waste of human life. Micah senses this for he knew that without a restoration of God's rule in the hearts of the people and so the hearts of the nation, the vision God gave him of true world peace would never come about.

The way of the world was, and still seems to be, to go to war in God's name, crush the opposition and declare peace. The way of God is different. To quietly seek after justice and equality, treating everyone as equal in the sight of God and peace takes care of itself, with no waste or loss.

These are the words of Micah 4 verses v2-3,

Chis NobuM.

"Come, let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, to the house of the God of Jacob. He will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths." The law will go out from Zion, the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. He will judge between many peoples and will settle disputes for strong nations far and wide. They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war any more.

We are called to trust God in this, because true peace comes not when nations and governments, armies and generals, have a winning strategy and more might, force and resources than the opposition. No, I believe that it will only come when we as individuals put God and His justice and equality at the centre of our lives, and so at the centre of our nations, and do all we can to ensure God's resources are shared fairly among all people.

Report from the October 2021 Botesdale PC Meeting

Four members of the Parish Council were present, with apologies from Greg Russell. We had an attendee who was! interested in coming on the Parish Council and just wanted to inclusive. We also published the Tender package for the see what it was like. We welcome anyone who wants to attend a meeting just to observe but we'd also love some new additions to the PC. Yes, there are the occasional dry administrative bits but most of what the PC does is interesting and adds! tremendous value to the community. It's a really worthwhile! thing to be involved in.

Public Forum: We had two members of the public, one of which was interested in the PC (see above) and the other asked ! Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan: The PC has agreed the questions about the plans for the Recreation Ground. There is a lot of information on the Parish Council website about the project - just check out http://botesdale.onesuffolk.net/ recreation-ground/regeneration-project/

District/County Cllr Fleming was unable to attend but sent in a report on council matters. An Independent Report into SCC Special Educational Needs services was published on 20th to www.suffolk.gov.uk and search on "SEND Review". comment on any aspect of the report or action plan please contact us via email at SendReview@suffolk.gov.uk. Also, the Hearing Sessions for the public examination of Mid Suffolk District Council's Joint Local Plan are underway. Sessions are being held virtually, enabling them to be fully inclusive, whilst also ensuring public safety, and are being live streamed in real! time on the councils' Joint Local Plan YouTube channel (search "bmsdc jlp" at youtube.com).

Planning: We had one planning application site on the border of Botesdale but actually in Rickinghall, the erection of an agricultural worker's dwelling on land off Potters Lane. There was a strong justification for the dwelling to service the nearby piggery unit at Rife Cottage Farm. The Common, Botesdale and ! the PC therefore had no objection. There were three notices of work to trees in the Conservation Area including at The Cottage. Bridewell Lane, Alcira, Back Hills and Walnut Tree Cottage, Back Hills. The PC had no objection to these.

Correspondence: The only item of correspondence related to information about the Local Plan Examination hearings.

Recreation Ground: The Project Design for the improved Recreation Ground is complete, incorporating the minor! adjustments arising from the Safety & Security Review of the designs. One of the recommended actions was the early removal of the youth shelter, which has been a focus for antisocial behaviour and is not going to be retained in the new!

design. The PC has agreed to remove the shelter, and this will happen sometime in November. Our next big step is to get planning permission for a single disabled parking spot at the entrance, which we hope will make the recreation ground more construction work on the gov.uk Contracts Finder website on 5 October and that notice will close on 5 November at 12noon. James Blake Associates has been appointed to oversee the tendering process. Finally, in order to make it easier to maintain the Recreation Ground we have accepted two quotes totalling £2,352 to enable a water connection on site. This will be in a lockable, vandal-proof cabinet.







Redgrave October 2021 Report – by the Clerk

Six councillors attended this meeting with apologies accepted from Brian Andrews, Netty Verkroost and Jason Walker.

Public Forum: A resident queried whether there was an update to considerations about the future of the Old School Playing Field. We have had no response from you about what you would like to happen to the Field but would still like to hear from you if you have any ideas!

There were five members/associates of the Redgrave Amenities Trust (RAT) present at the meeting to discuss the lease of the football pitch, play area and Activities Centre site. (The site has been on lease from the Llanover Estate, but the lease expired on 25 September and Llanover has declined to renew it as it objects to the site's designation as a Local Green Space in the Neighbourhood Plan. Llanover has requested that the site be allocated for development in the District Council's Local Plan.) The RAT expressed its concern about the potential loss of the facilities as the Llanover Estate has declared its intention to revert the site to agricultural use if it is unsuccessful. As a result, the RAT requested that the PC support the removal of the designation from the Neighbourhood Plan. It has also confirmed that the RAT currently has a temporary use arrangement with Llanover, on a day-to-day basis.

Planning: There were no planning applications.

Neighbourhood Plan: We are still waiting for a date for the public referendum on the adoption of the Plan. Unfortunately, there is a backlog of Plan referendums due to staffing problems in Electoral Services at Mid Suffolk District Council. We will let you know when we hear more.

Activities Centre Site Lease: The PC has discussed this at length and notes the RAT's concerns and the request to remove the Local Green Space designation from the Neighbourhood Plan. However, it is feared that if the Local Green Space designation is removed (and the Open Space designation from the Mid Suffolk Joint Local Plan), there is still no guarantee that the Llanover Estate will renew the lease. Llanover's submissions to the upcoming Joint Local Plan hearings indicate that they are still committed to their plan for extensive development on and near the site, which they presented to the village two years ago. The PC is mindful that their proposals were rejected by local people through the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group's questionnaires and exhibitions, by AECOM planning consultants in their assessment of the submissions to the Neighbourhood Plan's call for sites and by MSDC through their Local Plan call for sites. The PC is therefore looking at all available options to resolve the problem in line with the community's wishes

Lorry Route Review: We still haven't heard anything about the start of the review but understand that the Head of Transport Strategy in Suffolk is due to brief the County Councillors on the Lorry Route Review in the next few weeks and presumably will then contact parish councils with the details. Mike and Linda Hall who are organising local efforts tell us that due to the A1066 being closed at South Lopham for two weeks, the 'Lorry Count' planned for the week of 11th October had to be postponed, as this would clearly have affected the weight of traffic coming through the village during that period. They will re-schedule for another week. Two other interesting updates from the Halls: The Road Haulage Association advised that they have no control over GPS systems, but they "Do encourage drivers to avoid Residential"

Areas". The Dept of Transport also says there is no official control on Sat Nav routes, "But we do hope drivers are sensible". We thought you might enjoy those gems!

Council Documents: The PC's Standing Orders, Financial Regulations, Risk Assessment and Health and Safety Policy documents have all been reviewed and updated where necessary.

Remembrance Day: The parade/service will take place this year on 14 November – please keep an eye out for details.

Meeting Dates 2022: To consider 12 Jan; 2 Feb; 2 Mar; 6 Apr; 4 May; 1 Jun; 6 Jul; 7 Sep; 5 Oct; 2 Nov.

Verge Cutting: The PC sends heartfelt thanks to the Gressingham Foods team who cleared the overhanging vegetation along Hall Lane pavement. We know this is much appreciated by residents.

Parish Council Report October 2021 - by Cllr Stephen Pattenden

The meeting was quite quick and efficient since a number of the more usual items were not covered because there was no call for them.

There were no apologies for absence by any of the council members. However, there was excellent news that the Parish Council was able to fill two of the "casual vacancies" for council members so that it will be easier for the council to be quorate. The two people who had put their names forward were both relative newcomers to the village. Mr Brian Rhodes who has retired from financial services and Mr Andrew Gordon who has been in the oil industry . They each gave a short introduction, the Chair put their appointment to the vote, and both were unanimously elected to Rickinghall Parish Council. Both took up their duties immediately and proceeded to take part in the meeting.

There was a councillors' declaration of interest as Andrew Gordon had a planning application on the agenda. It was noted that he would need to recuse himself while this was discussed.

The minutes of the previous meeting were unanimously approved with no questions or comments. There being only one member of the public present, there for observation only, there was no public forum, so the meeting went straight on to Planning and Planning decisions.

Several planning applications were discussed including an application for an extension at 5 St Georges Drive and a new agricultural dwelling off Potters Lane. This was near the observatory relics of Micklewood Green, which raised a worry that it could impinge of the council-maintained site. However, no planning objections could be made to the application. This being the beginning of autumn there were also two applications to prune back or remove trees both of which the PC found perfectly reasonable.

Foremost of the decisions was one by Mid Suffolk District Council to grant planning permission on the ground between Red House and Honeysuckle Cottage off The Street which had been prevented from planning by the intervention of the heritage officer at MSDC. It had been pointed out that there had been many precedents for infilling in the village and the Parish Council was in favour as well as the MSDC councillor, Jessica Fleming, who had called in the application for debate by the Planning Committee at MSDC. The owners, Jessica and our Chair were all given three minutes to promote the cause of the application and after significant debate, MSDC council voted by 4 votes to 3 in favour of giving planning permission. This was regarded as a significant coup for the village and its Parish Council.

Correspondence: The Joint Local plan was now agreed, and a schedule set out for its examination by MSDC/SCC. Everything in the plan was agreed along with the schedule of its implementation.

The friends of St. Mary's Rickinghall (Inferior) were requesting funds for the repair to the church roof which had been estimated at £51,000 and they had asked RPC to contribute some funds to help out. This initiated a discussion around RPC's policy of building up funds and whether the existing policy of maintaining a reserve at about 50% of expenditure was correct. Working from the Budget report it was noted that there should be about £4,000 spare I funds available at year end and the Chair suggested that £2,000 should be granted to the Church for these repairs. This was agreed unanimously.

Under General Items there was discussion around the Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP) which had been worked on by both Rickinghall and Botesdale Parish Councils and was now ready to be submitted to MSDC. The funds for the PIIP would be coming from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) which is levied on developers to ensure that when they add developments to an area or village, the village can invest to manage the increased population. The PIIP is a list put together by the Parish Councils to ensure village additional needs are met. The document was discussed and unanimously recommended for submission to the district council.

There followed some administration in the review and update of council documents being the Standing Orders (of how the Parish Council should perform), the Financial Regulations (who is responsible for what to whom), the Reserves Policy (what proportion of parish expenditure should be held in the reserves), Health and Safety and Risk Assessment. There were very minor changes in all of these, and any changes were unanimously approved.

The Parish Council then turned to the issue of the street lighting replacement programme. SCC and UKPN between them manage the streetlights in the village and over time inefficient Sodium lamps are being replaced by more efficient LEDs and, in some cases, the cables feeding them are being buried. The report advised that some £16,500 is required for Rickinghall as (particularly) some lamps are placed close to metal clad pole termination units and that UKPN workers or their contractors are no longer willing to work near to these units when maintaining the lights. It was considered that around £13,500 was necessary in the near future for the high priority items. This would present considerable savings in power, carbon and maintenance but the funds needed to come from somewhere. The Parish Council has been operating a Street Light Improvement fund and has been placing £1,500 per annum into it. This fund now stands at £9,000 so a shortfall exists. It was noted that on past performance street light upgrade tended to occur over a period and not all at once and that with £1,500 pa. being put towards it every year, there might not be an issue. But this shortfall did highlight the importance of maintaining reserves. After all, the Parish Council exists for the wellbeing of the village and the ability to quickly fund necessary benefits is an important requirement for the village.

From the discussion around street lighting, the Parish Council moved on to Village Upkeep and the refurbishment of benches, approved; what we would do for Remembrance Day and who would be in the parade; to be updated about successful funding for the replacement Skate Park with some discussion over the height of ramps (i.e. was it for professionals or children) and an update over the progress of the County Broadband initiative to deliver Internet Fibre to the Premises to all the houses in Botesdale and Rickinghall (no news).

The council then looked at the finances, all of which were approved and the budget report which showed the proper way the Parish Council was being run and where we were with the finances.

Lastly, we dealt with Highways Issues (none reported), Welcome Packs (none needed) and Councillors' reports with very little to say about any of them. No matters were brought to the attention of the council for the next agenda.

HERITAGE CIRCLE

Beating the Bounds of Georgian Norwich David Berwick

The Heritage Circle held its September meeting at Rickinghall Village Hall when David Berwick gave a

talk entitled *Beating the Bounds of Georgian Norwich*. This well attended meeting was the first for the group since February 2020.

David has been researching parish boundary markers for many years and a number of these are still visible on buildings in Norwich. In the past defining the boundary of a parish was very significant. It indicated where people should worship but, more importantly where births, marriages and deaths should be recorded. For the church, it was vital to know who should be paying the parish rate which financed its work which included support for the poor until the middle of the 19th Century.

The boundary of a parish was marked by the ceremony of beating the bounds or perambulation. Local men and boys would each have a willow stick or osier which they used to hit various markers, such as stones, trees, walls, farm buildings and streams, on the edge of the parish. Beating the bounds had its origins in pagan times. The Romans had a festival called 'Robigalia' which was later adopted by Christians who organised 'Rogation Days' between the fifth Sunday after Easter and Ascension Day when people would call upon God to give them good weather for their crops. The willow stick was thought to have mystic qualities which would beat the devil out of the parish. This was often quite a raucous event. Parish records indicate that significant sums of money were spent on hospitality for the beaters. The beaters would be given food and beer as they progressed around the boundary. In 1821, 30 men spent two days beating the bounds of a small parish in Norwich while consuming 775 pints of beer!

The local vicar and parish clerk would identify a date for the ceremony and lead the group around the edge of the parish. Choir boys accompanying the beaters were often picked up and banged on the boundary markers, thrown over hedges or dropped into streams. It was intended to be a memorable experience so that the boundary would be known by a preliterate society which did not possess maps.

Beating the bounds was very important in Norwich as there were 40 parishes in 1800 which had complex boundaries. During the 18th Century engraved stones or metal plaques were put up on buildings and walls to mark parish boundaries. The oldest in Norwich dates from 1710 and is on the Coach and Horses pub in Bethell Street. The metal plaques were either made of cast iron or lead, and frequently contained quite elaborate designs. They have the initials of the church, such as SG for St Giles, the date put in place, and often a design linked to the saint the church was named after. St Clement was drowned in a river weighed down by an anchor and so the plaque of the church also has an anchor symbol. The beating of the bounds checked that there had been no encroachment on the parish boundaries by moving these plaques.

During the 19th Century responsibility for care of the poor and the registration of births and deaths was progressively taken over by the state, and so the practice of beating the bounds became less common. The most recent boundary marker in Norwich dates to 1854. The ceremony of beating the bounds has gradually become less common. However, it was revived for a fun, symbolic event for St Clement's Church in 2018.

The next meeting of the Heritage Circle will be on Wednesday 24th November at Rickinghall Village Hall when Geoffrey Kay will give a talk about the Festival of Britain of 1951. New members and visitors are very welcome. Further information is available at www.heritagecircle.onsuffolk.net.

COVID BOOSTER

Botesdale Health Centre are carrying out COVID booster clinics through November and December 2021 and our Patients will be called by age group once 6 months have elapsed after their second dose.

If you are unable to attend your appointment, you will need to go to a vaccination centre as you will not be recalled.

EAR SYRINGING

Unfortunately the Health Centre are no longer able to provide an ear syringing service.

They have continued to provide this service as a goodwill gesture when other surgeries have stopped but now, they have no alternative but to withdraw this service with immediate effect.

The traditional syringing method is no longer considered the first line treatment for the removal of ear wax and raises concerns surrounding safety. This is also not a funded service within the NHS for General Practice and, therefore, clinicians are not insured to carry out this procedure.

Excessive Earwax build-up

Ear wax is normal and is produced to form a protective coating in the ear canal. Ears are normally self-cleaning - the movement of your jaw whilst eating and talking helps to move the wax along the canal where it will usually fall out naturally without you noticing. However, wearing hearing aids, ear plugs or ear-phones, can prevent this natural clearing and cause a build-up. If you are concerned that you may have wax build up your audiologist or pharmacist will be able to assess and advise treatment.

Important: Don't use your fingers or any objects like cotton buds to remove earwax. This will push it in and make it worse.

How you can treat excessive earwax build-up yourself

You can use sodium bicarbonate to try and dissolve the wax yourself. You should buy sodium bicarbonate ear drops from your local pharmacy.

Please don't use any sodium bicarbonate you find in your kitchen cupboard.

The following should be done twice daily, as and when needed, for two weeks.

Lie on your side with the affected ear uppermost

Pull the outer ear gently backwards and upwards to straighten the ear canal

Put 2-3 drops of sodium bicarbonate into the affected ear and gently massage just in front of the ear

Stay lying on your side to allow the solution to soak in for around five minutes

Afterwards, wipe away any excess solution but do not plug your ear with cotton wool as this simply absorbs the solution

In most cases, the wax will have dissolved sufficiently after seven days without the need for further intervention. If you experience dryness or irritation after using bicarbonate of soda applying olive oil can help alleviate this. However, if you feel your hearing is still impaired, speak to your pharmacist. They may be able to suggest additional treatments.

Earwax and hearing aids

Hearing aid users are at high risk for excessive ear wax build-up. The presence of a foreign object in the ear seems to stimulate more wax production by the cerumen glands. Hearing aids need to be cleaned daily, allowed to dry overnight and cleaned with a brush in the morning to remove wax and debris. Failure to follow this cleaning step will reintroduce wax and debris into the ear and will prevent the aid from working effectively. For further information, you should contact your audiologist or visit a high street hearing care center, such as Boots Hearingcare or Specsavers.

When to see a nurse at your GP practice

If you have tried the above methods and your ear hasn't cleared

If your ear is badly blocked and you can't hear anything

Important: Not all GP practices remove earwax, some can: Flush the wax out with water (ear irrigation) Suck the wax out (microsuction)

These treatments are usually painless but are not always carried out at GP practices. You may have to pay to have them done privately.



Operation Turtle Dove

The sound of turtle doves purring, once a herald of summer in England, is sadly now very rare. In 2016 it was estimated that only 3,600 pairs remained in the UK, with a decline of 95% between 1995 and 2018. This shocking decline is due to food shortages on their breeding grounds reducing the number of nesting attempts turtle doves make, and unsustainable levels of hunting on migration to Africa. Birdlife International are making progress on the continent at reducing hunting pressures and this autumn the majority of provinces in Spain and France have declared a zero harvest until 2022. In Spain alone this means 900,000 fewer turtle doves being shot this year. As the UK population

migrate through France and Spain some of these birds will be from the UK meaning more individuals should return here next spring. It is on their breeding grounds that we have a real opportunity to make a difference for this once common species. In the right conditions turtle doves can have 3 broods in one breeding season, that is 6 potential new turtle doves to help the population recover!

Whilst turtle dove numbers have declined in Suffolk as elsewhere, the good news is that they are still here. Even better, we know how to help them:

Supplementary food helps turtle doves get into breeding condition when they return from Africa in April, when few other seed sources are available. This must be done with care, not feeding seed in piles, or using hoppers but instead spreading the seed very thinly to prevent spreading parasites such as Trichomonas.

Foraging plots of low growing seed rich plants such as clover, fumitory and birdsfoot trefoil, with plenty of bare ground so the turtle doves can access the seed, provide the best long-term solution to food shortages. Well-fed birds can have more nesting attempts and fledge more young. These foraging habitats also benefit pollinators and other seed and insect eating birds.

Water is essential for turtle doves. Their seed diet doesn't contain much water and they feed their young a crop milk made from seeds. Ponds are great for all kinds of biodiversity; making sure they have a shallow sloping edge or perches to access the water helps turtle doves.

Nesting habitat – Turtle doves tend to choose dense prickly large hedges and scrub to nest in. This helps protect the nest from predators and the weather as the nest is a very flimsy platform of twigs. Scrub might look unsightly to some, but it is excellent for many nesting birds and pollinators.

Remembrance Sunday

Following the pause caused by Covid-19, this year's Remembrance Sunday will be commemorated on Sunday November 14th. At 11am we salute the Fallen by a short period of silence at the War Memorial. All are welcome to observe this silence with us - please assemble at the Memorial just before eleven am.

2021 B&R Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP) - Final Update

There have been several articles about the PIIP in this magazine this year, describing what it is, laying out the process to generate and finalise it, and calling for residents' opinions. The consultation has now ended, and the PIIP Steering Group has produced the final plan which has been approved by Botesdale and Rickinghall Parish Councils. It will now be submitted to Mid Suffolk District Council to help them prioritise support for the community.

As a reminder, the PIIP is a guide to help Botesdale and Rickinghall Parish Councils prioritise infrastructure needs and aspirations of the community alongside future spending decisions, particularly where funds generated from local development are concerned. It's important to note that such funds do not become available all at once, but over a period of time as local housing developments progress, giving rise to *Community Infrastructure Levy* payments.



Exploring the Past

Doris Erith - 1938 - 2021

Over this year I have written about three ladies who have worked hard for our villages and the late Doris Erith is the fourth lady who has helped our young people. My son Mark was a pupil in her class when she first came to Redgrave and Botesdale School around 1973. My thanks to Nigel Rhodes, a former headmaster at Redgrave, who has given me permission to use this eulogy which he wrote and read for her funeral.



"I feel very privileged and honoured to be asked to say a few words about Doris, especially as there are many here who have known her much longer than I have. Nothing can take away the sadness of this occasion, but I hope that some of what occurs today will bring light and appreciation for the life she has had and the lasting impression she has left as her legacy. She would be smiling now, knowing that I was standing here talking about her in front of family, friends and former colleagues.

Doris' life was really based around the concept of 'Family'. She loved and lost personal family members with her husband, Mike. No one can know how this affected her, but somehow she managed to never show the sadness that must have existed in her life.

She built up a family of pupils, parents and colleagues, of which I will speak later.

Finally, she had a lasting family through her late son, David and his wife, Julie, that she never expected but loved and spoke frequently, proudly and lovingly about and so we share the loss with Mike and Julie and Josh, Ollie and Freddie.

To me Doris was 'Mrs Redgrave'...which is where I first met her. I can't recall whether she was the first person I met at my interview at the old primary school, but she is the one that has left the most lasting impression on my life...and this would have been over 30 years ago. She became a most revered, endearing and influential colleague and friend. I always thought that it was most fitting that she took on the Headship of the school in its last term before the move to St. Botolph's down the road in Botesdale.

That in itself is a story that needs to be told. When the new school was first mooted she said that would be the signal for her retirement from Education. No way was that going to happen and I had to be a little dishonest to persuade her to change her plans and make the move. She did eventually forgive me for the unexpected interview that she [and others] had to endure to make the move....but it was worth it.

In the Bible, Jesus speaks about 'Peter - The Rock" upon which his Church would be built...well Doris was my Rock when it came to St Botolph's, and I have no doubt the same was true for my predecessors at Redgrave. All my major actions, decisions and documents went through her. I learned very quickly to respect and listen to her opinions and judgements on a wide range of issues. I know that I was not the only colleague that valued her input and opinion and I also know that we all shared a mutual respect of her ability and talents in the classroom.

To use the Bible again, Jesus told the crowds to let the children come to him...well such was the case with Doris. She understood children, she helped children, she had empathy for children, she cared for children's needs and understood their desires and ambitions. She could enhance children's talents so that they could reach their potential and she also recognised her role as a teacher to inspire children.

Here are some of the memories that have been shared with me in recent weeks:

Lisa remembered her from her school days at Redgrave and especially her infectious laugh and that she was always smiling.

Alex recalled that Mrs Erith taught her to swim in the pool on the school playground and that it gave her so much confidence in the water. She also said that she was very kind and a wonderful teacher.

Another former pupil said he will always remember Mrs Erith and her saying, 'Shaun you are holding up the whole class...stop talking'. Even so he remembers her with much affection and feels that she contributed massively to him.

Chelsea said that she was very welcoming to a shy American girl and that she had a way of always making her feel the most important person in the room whenever she went to her for help.

Parents, too, shared their regard for Doris through memories of her time with their children.

Debbie recalls that her son Nathan always spoke about that smile that greeted you when you arrived for school each morning.

Charles and Lesley reminded me of the traditional hamsters she always had in her classroom and how their children, Helen and Catherine felt it was an honour to have the class pet stay at their home for the weekend. On one occasion the cage arrived home with no inhabitant. An urgent phone call resulted in a capture ...so no report to Trading Standards or Health and Safety. Her method of capture was ingenious. A wooden xylophone had its staves removed and a ladder erected. Food was placed in the box of the instrument, and hopefully it climbed up and slipped into the box - and capture. Sometimes it was to no avail and evidence was found when the old school was renovated after its closure.

Dawn and Debbie both recall the kittens that Doris seemed to provide for numerous households of children that attended the schools.

Liz, a local resident, first got to know Doris at a local Twinning event when the children performed their Maypole dancing routine to total perfection, impressing our French guests as well as all the parents and other guests present. This of course was repeated more years than not at summer fetes...and always included both boys and girls ... a real feat of success.

Mary was both a parent and colleague and recalls how each of her children, Michelle, Annie and Aaron remember her with much affection, even though Aaron was frequently told to sit still as he was such a fidget.

Another former colleague and parent, Christine, remembers Doris for just loving her job and like most of us, thought she would go on forever. She was her daughter, Alexandra's favourite teacher [probably not alone there] and recalls a story I had no knowledge of. Apparently, if anyone in the class had new shoes, Doris would ask them to stand on the table and show them off. Alex said she was embarrassed to start with, but then she loved being the centre of attention.

Verena recalls spending time with Doris after school in a classroom discussing the children and life in general and how she would listen and make all sorts of positive suggestions and ideas for going forward.

Sarah was a new teacher when she arrived at St Botolph's and, like so many others, wishes to remind everyone what a wonderful, amazing and re-assuring lady she was and there is not one former pupil, parent, colleague, friend or



family member that would not agree with that summary."

Nigel finished his eulogy with a lovely poem but I am sorry that space has run out to include it.



Memories of School Days

In 1988 Mrs Margaret Chapman, then a teacher at Rickinghall school, wanted to do a project with her pupils about earlier school days. She wrote to the Diss Express asking for any former pupils to get in touch, with their memories. She had several replies and some of the former pupils were invited to come to talk to the children. The oldest pupil who wrote to her was Lilian Cater who had been at Rickinghall School for several years from 1907. Lilian wrote describing her school days in the following delightful letters which we will print this month and next month. Letters from other former pupils will be in future Parish Magazines.

First letter from Lilian Cater (née Bullock)

Nov. 11. 1988

Dear Mrs Chapman,

My daughter has just spotted your piece in the Diss Express & thought it 'Right up my street'. No wonder, she has heard so much about my school days.

From Lilian Cater Mrs.

Rickinghall School

Oh, how I enjoyed my school days!

It would be 1907 when I started there, the school bell rang at 9am and how we ran. The Infant teacher was Miss Kemp, beginners sat on stair arrangement seats, the older ones in desks. Our teacher was a prim lady with her belt and keys hanging from it, and a black apron. She had a school room farthest from the entrance to school premises. The playground had big hard pebbles, horrible things to play on, but we were allowed to play on the footpath from the stile past the back of the church and school under the lime trees, over a bridge and out to the main road. Of course, we were never allowed beyond the trees.

9a.m. assembly was in the main room with little ones carrying their chairs from the Infants room; here we had a hymn and a prayer. Thursday mornings we had a real singing ½ hour with Miss Canham at the harmonium - rather a mannish lady who took the boys for drawing whilst the girls were in their sewing class taken by Miss Burt. (Miss Canham was the daughter of a former Head master)

She was a good teacher who would not be played with. We used what was known as the 'new class room' this was beside the footpath which ran along the back of the school.

The headmaster was Mr Palmer; such a nice man. In those days boys were caned if they were really naughty. They didn't know what I had overheard.....that if he had to cane a boy he had a violent headache afterwards.

Morning assembly with a hymn and a prayer was in the same room with all the children, then each class went to their class rooms. There would be 2 classes in the main hall (one each end) and those dreadful tortoise stoves; we were almost too cold to write. I often wondered if they were alight!

Opposite the Master's desk, hanging on the wall, was a black slate and each day the attendees were written there; often over 100 pupils. Often the Rector would take the top class for religious knowledge. This was in the new classroom where he so often sat on the guard around the fire, not thinking about keeping the heat off us. This room had an open fire.

I was so sorry for the children who came from West Street, Allwood Green or Botesdale Common. They of course had a packed lunch, often only a lettuce leaf between two pieces of bread and butter. Yes, it was butter, because I never heard of margarine until the war years. In the dinner hour they would walk up to Aldrich and Bryants shop and do their mothers' shopping, eating as they went. Then the shop things hung in the porch until they went home.

I remember trying to teach a boy from that area to read. He was in Miss Shaw's class; a fussy little lady, inclined to dither. I was told to pay great attention and learn all I could because my father was paying the teacher. I couldn't work it out, but knew there was something in it. I suppose he meant he paid taxes or whatever! The lad I was helping from Allwood Green had been up feeding chickens before school at Falcons Hall. Mr Barker employed many men in those days and, strangely, his son was also one of the lads I was helping.

Now I remember chanting the tables, money, weights etc. such as 12 pence 1 shilling 36 pence = 3/-, 20 cwt 1 ton. Also, the sloping desktop with an ink well at the top. Drilling out in the playground with grumpy Miss Burt (said to be Welsh). I liked silent hour when we could choose our own book and read it. I remember sharing a book called 'Black Beauty', the story of a lovely horse. I shared it with one of the Hill brothers. I also remember sewing, in war time, two lengths of calico together to make a sheet, and the spiders web I made on the fold over at the top, and Mr Palmer's amusement when he asked whatever was I doing? (Wartime 1914 to 1918)



Here are the teachers again. Infant teacher Miss Kemp, Class 1 Miss Canham, Class 2 Miss Shaw, Class 3 Miss Burt, Mr Palmer took the rest. We had slates to write on sometimes. I didn't like them. We chanted our tables so lots of the lazy ones didn't really know theirs! So failed their sums!

Now I am 86 years of age and full of arthritis so you must excuse the writing.





Sometimes it is necessary to invent a new word to express something that cannot otherwise be expressed. It is apparent that this must have happened when the word excruciating was produced to express the idea of inexpressible pain and suffering. Clearly the idea of the crucifixion of Jesus conveyed that idea as the word comes from the Latin 'ex crux' meaning 'out of the cross.' The cross was only used for a short time in history. I do not know whether it is true or not but I have been told that the Romans gave up using it as the death penalty as it was thought to be too cruel even by them. It depicts the ultimate in suffering producing the word excruciating.

Recently a friend of mine sat with someone dying and held his hand for two hours as he slipped away. Afterwards she was distraught saying that she felt God didn't love her and felt that her sin had put a barrier between herself and God. I presume that she had prayed desperately for that dying friend and very much needed a miracle of healing to occur. I imagine she prayed for the whole of those two hours. It didn't happen and her friend passed away. She didn't get the answer she wanted to her prayers.

What is the answer to this dilemma? God answers prayers, God is a God of love and forgiveness yet we can feel he doesn't hear us and can't forgive us for something when he doesn't give us what we ask for. I suggest the answer is this: look at the cross. It is the cross that exhibits what Jesus went through for you. All that pain and suffering expresses how great is his love for you. It isn't the answer or lack of one that needs to speak to us, it is the cross. In the same way it is the cross that expresses his forgiveness. If you feel you have done wrong, offended God and that he can't forgive you then look at the cross. In the same way as it expresses the magnitude of his love it demonstrates the depth of his forgiveness. You feel rubbish, you feel forsaken, you feel hopeless, then look at the cross.

In the Old Testament book of Isaiah there is a passage that, even though it was written hundreds of years before Jesus was crucified, depicts the crucifixion. It is such a remarkable prophecy that it appears as if Isaiah had been sitting at the foot of the cross as Jesus died causing him to write of it and explain its meaning. As he nears the end of his experience he makes an amazing statement about Jesus. He says, "He shall see the fruit of the travail of his soul and be satisfied." In other words Jesus looks at everyone who has accepted his sacrifice on the cross for the forgiveness of sins and says to himself, "It was worth

When you are feeling rubbish, forsaken, hopeless, sinful or unloved then look at the cross and hear Jesus say, "You were worth it, you are worth it. However you feel, you are really worth what I went through there."

"Out of that terrible travail of soul, he'll see that it's worth it and be glad he did it."

Isaíah Ch 53 v.11



Conservation & Community

Damp November mornings signal an explosion of fungi, from wild mushrooms in the fields, to woodland species on and around trees and logs. Hedgehogs will be getting ready for hibernation so please be vigilant with November bonfires. Look around tree stumps for evidence of small mammals collecting winter food stores - part eaten cob nuts and their shells may be found under hazel bushes, jays and grey squirrels bury large numbers of nuts which will grow if not eaten.

Winter thrushes will be arriving along with starlings from Scandinavia, who will start to gather and perform their murmurations, especially over Redgrave and Lopham Fen. Tawny owls are very active and vocal in November as this year's young disperse and form new pairs. The female tends to make a 'kwik' sound while the male makes the classic 'ooo' sound, quite loudly some evenings. Many thanks to Reg Langston for his input here!

One of our bigger tasks this Autumn was cutting and clearing this year's vegetation from SWT's TheInetham Fen and our adjoining New Fen. This was done jointly by LOHP and SWT volunteers and will allow the fen plants such as the various species of orchids to flourish next year.

The Creative Fen Group will be holding an Art Exhibition at the Fox pub in Garboldisham on the 19th, 20th and 21st of November.

We are delighted to say that the LOHP AGM will be held on 10th December at Garboldisham Village Hall. The speaker this year will be Matt Gooch from SWT, who was (and is!) one of the main driving forces behind the development of Carlton Marshes. More AGM info in next month's article.



STAY SCAM SMART

YOUR MONEY IS AT RISK

Fraudsters continue to exploit our online vulnerability. Alongside the familiar text messages purporting to be from HMRC or the mysterious parcel that could not be delivered, numerous fake e-commerce or investment platforms have sprung up successfully tricking people into moving large sums of money into fraudsters pockets.

Not everyone is who they say they are. Even large national companies' websites can be cloned and look like the real thing.

Pension fraud is now rising fast with £2 million syphoned off by fraudsters in the first half of this year alone who have tempted people to move money from existing pension pots with the lure of greater interest rates.

Furthermore, growing numbers of unregulated firms are offering highly risky financial products and services such as cryptocurrency which, despite the Bank of England stating that cryptocurrency is dangerous and that people should only invest if they are prepared to loose all their money, it has become a popular choice with many, supported by 'fake news' of celebrity endorsement and so called 'influencers.'

It is widely accepted that many of us don't have the in-depth knowledge to make major financial decisions without specialised advice.

But how do you know who to trust when the consequences of a rash decision could cost you your life savings? Firstly, consult a financial adviser who is governed by the Financial Conduct Authority's Regulations. The FCA website will also alert you to any warnings and enable you to check on investment companies to see if they are genuine. The banks are now heavily regulated following the PPI insurance mis-selling and are playing a key role, but protecting their customers from external mis-sold financial services is harder than it looks. Although they did manage to intervene and stop two thirds of the attempted £1.6 billion financial fraud in 2020.

To that end, some banks have halted customers transferring money to cryptocurrency purchase or trading platforms. The Financial Conduct Authority have called for a government online safety bill to outlaw fraudulent financial advertising. But until that happens, the fraudster sharks will continue to circle. We all need to be on our guard to protect our savings and pensions from being stolen!



Your community needs you!

I'm a single parent and lost my job during the pandemic. My local Citizens Advice helped me apply for Universal Credit which has been really helpful to cover some of the income I've lost. But I'm very worried about the upcoming £20-a-week cut to Universal Credit, particularly with ongoing school costs - is there any other support out there to help plug the gap?

If you're on a low income or unemployed, you might be able to get help with some of the costs of sending your child to school, including school meals, transport and uniform. It's always worth talking to your local education authority to see what support is available as some of their resources and offerings can differ.

Free school meals

Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 automatically get free school meals. If you have older children you can apply for free school meals if you get certain benefits. In your case as you're on Universal Credit and you applied after 1 April 2018 you would be eligible if you earn less than £7,400 a year without benefits. You can see the full list of eligibility requirements on the national Citizens Advice website – just go to citizensadvice.org.uk and search "school meals" on the site.

Transport

If your children are aged between five to 16, your local education authority might offer free or lower cost transport if you don't live near school or your child's unable to walk there. You need to apply to Suffolk County Council for help.

Uniforms and other costs

Suffolk County Council might also be able to help with some other costs, like uniforms, music lessons or trips and activities. There may also be local charitable schemes to help with these costs, it's worth checking with the school to see if it knows of any. Schools can also sometimes advise on finding secondhand uniforms.

If it gets too much

If you are starting to fall behind on your bills, then Citizens Advice can help. Our Advisers can look at your budget to see if we can help you save money and check that you're claiming everything that you're entitled to.


