

CHUBBY BUNNIES AND A CROSS

I wonder if you have ever played the game, 'Chubby Bunnies?' If not, the idea is that you place a standard size marshmallow in your mouth, and then, without swallowing, you clearly say the words 'chubby bunny.' If you manage to do this you place a second marshmallow in your mouth and, without swallowing either marshmallow, repeat the words 'chubby bunny.' You then continue to add marshmallows into your mouth until you find a winner. The winner being the person that has the most marshmallows in their mouth and can still clearly say, 'chubby bunny.' It may be that you are a mature person and so have not played such a game. But if like me you haven't grown up, or you work with young people, (which is my excuse) then you may have played this.

Within youthwork you tend to play Chubby Bunnies at this time of year, in the lead up to Easter. And that makes sense as Easter is all about bunnies, and therefore, chocolate.

In an Easter special of one of my favourite tv programmes, 'The Vicar Of Dibley,' Alice asks the Vicar if she believes in the Easter Bunny. The Vicar replies, "The Easter Bunny absolutely, and totally, does not exist."

If you've seen this episode you will remember that the tradition in Dibley was that a villager dresses up as the Easter Bunny and during the night delivers chocolate. But when that person died, she asks as many people as she can to take over the role, so by the end of the programme there's a whole colony of Easter Bunnies. Hilarious!

It seems that such traditions of Easter may have overtaken the reality of the occasion. I would like to remind you of that reality. The Bible tells us of a night when the Son of God, Jesus, was arrested on trumped-up charges. That Jesus then went through a series of carefully controlled hearings. And all to bring about this the following day:

'By this time it was about noon, and darkness fell across the whole land until three o'clock. The light from the sun was gone. And suddenly, the curtain in the sanctuary of the Temple was torn down the middle. Then Jesus shouted, "Father, I entrust my spirit into your hands!" And with those words he breathed his last.' (Luke 23:44-46.)

The authorities thought that was the end of it. They had hung Jesus on a cross and he was dead. However, just three days later:

'Very early on Sunday morning the women went to the tomb, taking the spices they had prepared. They found that the stone had been rolled away from the entrance. So they went in, but they didn't find the body of the Lord Jesus. As they stood there puzzled, two men suddenly appeared to them, clothed in dazzling robes. The women were terrified and bowed with their faces to the ground. Then the men asked, "Why are you looking among the dead for someone who is alive? He isn't here! He is risen from the dead!" (Luke 24:1-6a)

This is what Easter is all about. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. In fact this is why Jesus came. Yes, he came to show us how to love each other, and how to live in a way God would want us to.

But ultimately Jesus came to Earth to die and to rise again. So that, should we believe, we can have a relationship with our God.

The Easter Bunny and the chocolate it leaves is a fun story for our children. And that episode of The Vicar Of Dibley is one of my favourites. In Dibley at least an Easter Bunny really did exist.

But more importantly Jesus really did, and does, exist. He is the Son of God. And on one Good Friday, over 2000 years ago, he was killed on a cross. And then on what we call Easter Sunday, he rose from the grave in a glorious victory.

As fun as it is in our house to hide chocolates for the children, and even nibble an odd Easter egg myself, for me Easter is about Jesus, his death on a cross, and his resurrection.

So why don't you make this reality part of your Easter? Because Jesus didn't go through that just for me, he did that for all of us. And why? Because he loves you.

I hope you all have a fantastic Easter!

I ordered a watch online for my partner's birthday. The company has since gone out of business. I keep phoning and emailing them but can't get through to anyone. If they don't send the watch, what should I do?

If the company has gone into administration, it may still be able to fulfil outstanding orders, but if the company is already in liquidation, you'll

need to try to get your money back. If you're unsure about what state the company is in, the Citizens Advice website has information on how to find out.

As the company hasn't responded to your calls or emails, is there a shop or office you can visit or write to, to get an update on your order or request a refund? If that isn't possible, the next steps depend on whether it's a limited company (it will have ltd or plc after its title) or if it's a sole trader (someone who runs their own business) or partnership.

If it's a limited company, you'll need to get details of the administrator or receiver - the person dealing with settling the trader's debts. The names of those administrators will usually be on the website of the company that's gone bust. You should register your claim as a creditor on the GOV.UK website. Fill out the form with details of what you're owed and send it to the administrator dealing with the trader's debts. Unfortunately, there's only a small chance you'll receive any money back because you'll be last in a long list of creditors who need to be paid.

If you paid by credit card, you could also try getting your money back with a Section 75 claim to your card provider or bank. Full details about both these types of claims can be found on the Citizens Advice website. If the seller was a sole trader or partnership and not a limited company, pursuing a Section 75 is your best option.

Every case is different when traders go under, but you can call the Citizens Advice consumer helpline to find out exactly what your rights are on 0808 223 1133 or visit www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer

WALKWAY SHELTER & PHARMACY QUEUE

The PPG would like to thank the Doctors at the Health Centre for their assistance with the Walkway Shelter which has now been erected outside the Health Centre to keep Patients dry whilst they queue at the Pharmacy. Friends of Botesdale Health Centre have funded the project.

Patients have asked why the structure could not have 'sides'. After researching the project it was understood structures with 'sides' are sometimes used for anti-social purposes once Health Centres are closed at the end of a day. Therefore the decision was made to have a roof only covering.

We have also been asked by Patients why there is now a Pharmacy queue at all? As we will have all read or heard in media coverage there is a countrywide problem with distribution of medicinal drugs. Therefore in conjunction with all other Pharmacies, the collection received by a Patient may not be complete and unfortunately requires a further visit to the Pharmacy. This also means that Patients attending at the Pharmacy have more queries which takes more time to resolve.

We have also been asked to emphasise that Patients should only attend for collection of medication when they know they have allowed for the requisite time to elapse for its preparation. The Pharmacy have also requested Patients' assistance by not overloading the system by ordering medication ahead of the date noted on the prescription.

The Botesdale Pharmacy has advertised for three new members of staff and are in the process of recruiting which will assist the smooth running of the facilities.

HELP DESK

Following a fully researched Pilot Study, the PPG are providing a Help Desk in the Health Centre.

The Help Desk will be resourced by trained volunteers on a once-a-week rotation to reach as many Patients as possible. The Help Desk will assist Patients with directions, the use of the Booking-In System, as well as providing information including newsletters from the Health Centre. We anticipate this will be very helpful to Patients.

The Help Desk volunteers will also endeavour to answer queries of an administrative nature. If they cannot answer directly they will liaise with a member of the Health Centre Staff and arrange to telephone back with the response. This will save patients queuing at Reception.

Report from the March 2023 Botesdale PC Meeting

Public Forum: Residents of The Fairstead, opposite the Health Centre, reported that inconsiderate parking was escalating into a major problem. A recent incident saw the entrance to The Fairstead completely blocked for 15 minutes.

Report Bad Parking: Did you know that you can report illegal parking online? Take a photo and go to https://westsuffolk-self.achieveservice.com/service/Report street parking infringement

Parking on Back Hills: Further to previous discussions, the PC received a reply from St Botolph's School confirming that there was no scope for additional parking at the school. However, they will be contacting parents reminding them to consider their necessity to drive to school, to park appropriately for the area and to use the car parks made available to them. The PC has also reconsidered the provision of double-yellow lines at the junction of Back Hills and The Fairstead. These will reinforce the Highway Code restrictions for parking at junctions and will not remove any legitimate parking spaces. Double yellow lines are expensive due to the need for a legal Traffic Regulation Order so the PC will be combining this with other similar works (see below).

Parking on Chapel Lane: The PC has received complaints about parking too near the junction with Bridewell Lane and will pursue a Traffic Regulation Order for double-yellow lines at that site. As with Back Hills, these will simply reinforce the Highway Code Restrictions.

Extension of 30mph on Hall Lane (B1113): The PC has agreed to pursue a Traffic Regulation Order to extend the 30mph to just north of Back Hills on the B1113.

Steps to FP15 Bridewell Lane: The work to the road surface beneath the steps has been completed and we think it is a tremendous improvement!

Coronation: The PC has agreed to give a commemorative coin to all children at St Botolph's School to mark the coronation of King Charles III. They will also be made available to other children on application to the Parish Clerk.

The Recreation Ground Refurbishment has been completed and will be open from 1 April 2023!

Dog Fouling

Botesdale, Redgrave and Rickinghall Parish Councils are regularly contacted about dog fouling in the parishes and are asking residents and other dog walkers to help us do something about it.

Apart from being unsightly and a nuisance, dog fouling can be a health risk, as it often contains the parasitic roundworm Toxocara. Contact with Toxocara can lead to contracting the disease Toxocariasis which leads to flu-like symptoms and if untreated can lead to eye damage or blindness. Fresh faeces is not infectious (so it's safe for owners to clean up after their dogs) but if the faeces is left for 2-3 weeks it may become infectious. Each deposit of dog faeces can carry up to 1 million Toxocara eggs. Toxocariasis is contracted through contact with faeces through swallowing – this is often through touching infected items such as shoe soles and toys without washing hands adequately afterwards. For this reason the disease is more common amongst children, so it is especially alarming that people are failing to clear up after their dogs in areas regularly used by children, such as the

pavements and verges leading to the school.

It is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 not to clear up after your dog. Mid Suffolk District Council is able to issue 'Fixed Penalty Notice' fines of £50 as an alternative to prosecution (where the potential fine is £1,000), to those caught in the act.

Don't let the thoughtless actions of a few give the dog owners of our villages a bad name – if you have a dog, please ensure that you always bag its faeces and either put it in a dog bin, public litter bin or double wrap it and put it in your black wheelie bin. Please do not bag it and toss it in an overgrown verge or leave it hanging on a bush/tree as so many do – as we've explained above, this allows it the time to become infectious if it contains Toxocara. Also, it's very unpleasant for our litter pickers to encounter!

If you see anyone failing to clean up after their dog, <u>politely</u> encourage others to do their duty (many people fail to clean up when they think there is no-one else around). If you do not feel confident about making contact, please let the District Council know who they are – it is possible that they could be issued with a fine. If you do not know who they are, but are able to give a description of them and the registration of their vehicle, please let the District Council know so that they can follow it up.



Parish Council Report for March - by Alison Spouncer

The meeting for March 2023 had four apologies from Councillors. County and District Councillor Fleming was in attendance, and three members of the public.

Public Forum

Residents of Moneypot Hill were in attendance, on behalf of all Moneypot Hill's residents relating to DC/22/04600; a revised application for planning permission for now four chalets and a change of access road. The residents wished to re-iterate their objections regarding the lack of sustainability and need for holiday accommodation. The Council, noting that the application had been received only one day before its meeting, decided to respond once councillors had had a chance to properly consider the full details of the revised application.

Maintenance of Benches around the Village: The Parish Council will be undertaking various levels of maintenance on the benches needing some attention. This, it is hoped, will be happening over the coming months.

Phase 2 and 3 of the Children's Playground and Village Hall Projects: Conversations have continued with various landowners; further options are being pursued with agreement of the Council to continue in the hope of providing a village hall facility and area for older children.

The issue of an increase in litter continues to be noticed. It is requested that refuse is disposed of responsibly and taken home.

Parish Council Report March 2023 by Cllr Brian Rhodes

The Rickinghall Parish Council held its monthly meeting on 2nd March 2023. This included Cllr Ian Patterson who was welcomed as a new councillor. We are very grateful to Ian for joining our PC and take this opportunity to remind members of the parish that we still have some vacancies. Four members of the public attended the meeting.

Three planning applications were considered by the PC:

The first application was for the addition of a two-storey extension at West Street Farm Cottage, West Street. No objection was raised regarding this development.

The second application was for the erection of a single storey extension and reworking of a section of roof to the rear of The Anchorage, The Street, including the Listed Building Consent. There was no objection to this application.

The third application was for the erection of a front single storey extension to form an entrance porch at 39, Church Meadow and again there was no objection.

Notices to prune/remove trees in a Conservation area:

One application had been made: The Laurels, Rectory Hill for the reduction and shaping of six trees. No objection was raised but the PC noted that the quality of the site plans attached to the application (not just these but others recently) continue to be generally poor, making the task of understanding the applications unnecessarily difficult. Applicants are requested in future to please try to be more accurate and clear in the submitted site plans.

Planning Decisions:

It was noted that the variation to conditions relating to the creation of a Hot Food Takeaway at Bell Hill Cottage, The Street had been granted by MSDC.

General Items:

An internal audit of the PC's financial controls has been carried out with no issues found.

The PC has determined to gift a commemorative coin to all children of the Parish to mark the coronation of King Charles

The PC, in conjunction with Botesdale PC, has agreed to assist with the funding of new boilers for St Botolph's School. It also agreed to provide a number of new chairs for the Rickinghall Day Centre. Both of these have been funded under the Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP). The PC was advised that the Suffolk CC budget has been approved with a 4% increase but that MSDC had decided to freeze council tax and to absorb any increases in its costs. There will be a 7% increase in social housing rents, partly due

to the work needed to be undertaken on these.

On environmental issues, The PC has been informed that Northumberland Water has advised that it intends to plant fruit trees, a native species boundary hedge and to maintain the area as a meadow at its site at the end of Garden House Lane. The PC also understands that an appeal has been lodged against MSDC's refusal for the development of a photovoltaic solar array, battery storage and ancillary infrastructure on land to the south of Suggenhall Farm, Church Lane.

Finally, the PC gave a provisional indication that it might be willing to contribute to the funding of solar panels to be installed on the SW facing roof of the village hall. The Village Hall committee advised it was currently exploring various grants that may be available to cover the bulk of the costs.

Notes from the Green Redgrave Group

So, the planting season is over - we thought! We have just been the fortunate recipients of another nearly 1,000 trees from the Woodland Trust. But really, with the sorts of summers we have been having in recent years, we do not want to be putting them in their final positions just yet. A lack of moisture in their first year would probably spell disaster for them. We have therefore decided to heel them in all together to sites where they can be easily watered during the summer, and then transplant them to their final locations next Autumn. That gives us some more work for the next planting season. Thanks again to all those volunteers who have helped with the planting of the roughly 4,000 trees this past winter. More work for you in due course!

In the meanwhile, not all work is stopping. We will be creating a wildflower patch around the new children's playground in the Redgrave Old School Playing Field in the coming weeks. There will be maintenance work around all of the trees that we have planted. And we are also about to carry out our survey work for the year, starting off with ancient & veteran tree and hedgerow surveys. As the year progresses, we will be conducting bird, insect and bat surveys. Butterflies and moths will also be surveyed as will wildflowers in the area. We hope to engage as many people as we can in this work including children where possible. All volunteers extremely welcome!

Good news as well. The Green movement continues to advance. The Green Hinderclay Group has just started up and we have agreed to partner closely with them. Good luck and best wishes to that new Group in all that it decides to do!

Our excursion to see the Snettisham Wader Spectacular in February did not come off because of weather conditions at the time. We are hoping we can do it in March. In the meanwhile, we are planning other excursions as well. We have a trip planned to Hemp Meadow Wood in Kenninghall in May or June. This wood was bought in 2002 and created the following year by residents of Kenninghall. It is an inspiring place which shows what can be done for wildlife and nature if a village is determined to do it. We also plan, together with Green Hinderclay, to visit Fairoaks Farm in Westhorpe in June to see how they have been undertaking a large (and relatively new) conservation project; date to be announced.

We have just bought a range of new habitat boxes including two for tawny owls, one for kestrels, one for woodpeckers and other more common bird boxes. We have also sponsored the purchase by residents of hedgehog boxes and we hope that we can increase the population of these increasingly rare creatures over the coming years. A picnic bench will be delivered in the coming months. All of these items have been bought from the Street Forge Workshops in Thornham Magna. Do go and visit this admirable charity if you have not already done so. See https://streetforgeworkshop.uk/ for more details.

Our latest Green Redgrave talk was by Dr Rowena Langston who spoke about the ongoing work of the Little Ouse Headwaters Project. This was very inspiring and very well attended. Our next Green Redgrave meeting will be held on Tuesday 4th April at 7 pm (location to be confirmed). There will be no talk at this meeting; rather we will, hopefully, be showing a new film called "A Surge of Memories". This commemorates the 70th anniversary of the 1953 floods, with reflections on the 2013 East Coast Tidal Surge and what the future holds for our coast. It is licensed for educational use only by community groups and schools.

We are still looking for enthusiastic volunteers to help us progress our activities. If you want to contribute or just learn about wildlife friendly activities then please join us. Ups and Downs – Barnardo's Foster Children in Suffolk 1890-1950 by Peter Davidson

Peter Davidson gave a very interesting talk to the February meeting of the Heritage Circle at Rickinghall Village Hall which was based upon his

extensive research into children from Dr Barnardo's Homes who were fostered in Wickham Skeith and Suffolk between 1890 and 1950. He fears that this is a story which is in danger of being forgotten.

Thomas Barnardo was studying medicine at the London Hospital in Whitechapel when he became aware that there were significant numbers of boys who were destitute and living on the streets. He set up a home for boys in Stepney Causeway in 1870. The boys were expected to work, for example they chopped wood or were messenger boys. In 1876 he established a Girls' Village Home in Barkingside, Essex. The numbers of children in need grew to such an extent that a solution other than building more homes was required. From 1883 children were boarded or fostered in rural villages which were remote from factories. By 1889 there were 710 children boarded out across the south east of England and the Midlands and this number increased to about 4,500 by 1906. The school logbook for Wickham Skeith mentions a regular flow of Barnardo children into the village school from 1891. In the 1911 census there were 29 fostered children in Wickham Skeith which was about 20% of the 150 children recorded there. The fostered children stayed until the age of 13 or 14 when the boys were sent to learn a trade and the girls went into

Between 1893 and 1930, about 30,000 Barnardo children were sent to Canada, 30 of them came from Wickham Skeith. Most had the opportunity to start a new life but some were physically or sexually abused. This was particularly true of boys who were often sent as labourers to remote farms in Manitoba. Girls tended to be placed with families where they could learn domestic skills.

Some of the children cared for by Barnardo's were orphans, others were illegitimate or neglected but most were there as a result of their mother's death during child birth. Between 1850 and 1930 women had a one in 20 chance of dying giving birth. However, this fell rapidly in the 1940s with the use of ergometrine to stop post-natal haemorrhaging.

Fostering of children at Wickham Skeith was a financial transaction but they were not abandoned by Barnardo's once placed. In 1905 foster parents were given 5s. (25p) per week for each child at a time when agricultural labourers earned 15s. (75p) per week. Foster parents had to sign an agreement that they would bring up boarders in a loving environment, just like their own children. A woman in the village monitored the care of boarders when she paid the weekly allowance to foster parents. Sick children were given medical care and there was a six monthly check by inspectors on the weight, height and physical condition of boarders. Peter Davidson has often found evidence of considerable affection between children and their foster parents.

The need for care for children by Barnardo's diminished after 1945. The death rate of mothers giving birth fell considerably. The creation of the Welfare State helped single parent families to stay together. In addition, the Children's Act of 1948 gave the responsibility for child care to local authorities. The practice of fostering children in Wickham Skeith appears to have ended about 1950 by which time there had been about 200 children fostered in village.



Nyall's Notes LOHP Local News

Last month I said that I would show you that Jesus claimed to be God. It was C S Lewis who observed, "A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic — on the level with the man who says he is a poached egg — or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse.

Moses was asked by God to go back to Egypt and tell Pharaoh to let the Israelites, who were slaves in Egypt, go. Moses wasn't too keen. It was like personally telling Putin to get out of Ukraine. It looked suicidal. He asked God, "Who shall I say sent me? What is your name? God replied, "I am what I am. Call me I am." That is how God got the name Yahweh. It means 'I am' in Hebrew.

Conservation & Community

Sang the sunrise on an amber morn-Earth, be glad! An April day is born. Winter's done, and April's in the skies, Earth look up with laughter in your eyes! Charles George Douglas Roberts (1860-1943).

As I write there is horizontal sleet rushing past my window, so I hope that by the time you are reading this, the weather will have improved!

Things really start to get going on our sites as the days get longer and the temperature rises. Resident birds will be building nests and migratory birds will be returning. Listen for cuckoos later in the month, as the fens are still fortunate in having a good number of reed warblers to 'host' the cuckoo chicks!

If you hear what sounds like a pig squealing from some reed bed or damp patch, that will be a water rail, easier to hear than see!

Vivid yellow celandines should be appearing and sweet violets will be flowering. One of the earliest spring flowers, dog's mercury, should also be in evidence. This is a low growing woody plant with tiny greenish flowers between the leaves.

Ewes and their lambs and Redpoll cattle with calves will be grazing some of the sites, so if you are walking your dog please keep them on a lead. You know the drill!

Two events for your diary; On Saturday 1st April, we will be holding a walk (10.30-12.30), "Fenland Trees- an amateur's view from the ground". Details on our website: www.lohp.org.uk. On Sunday 16th April, we will have a stall at the famous Suffolk Wildlife Trust's Peat-free Plant sale, so why not pop in and say hello.



Exploring the Past

Shop Bill to Thomas Holt, Redgrave Hall, 1787

In February I wrote about shops in Redgrave. I recently came across an article I had written for the parish Magazine in 2006 about a shopkeeper's bill to Thomas Holt of Redgrave Hall, sent in 1787. Thomas may not have been living at Redgrave Hall at this time as he only inherited the Redgrave Estate in 1786 when his brother Rowland died childless, as Thomas did in 1799, and the estate was then inherited by George Wilson, the son of their niece Lucinda. George became a rear admiral.

The shopkeeper, Charles Munns, was described as a tallow chandler. The shop was situated in Botesdale, approximately where the Chilvers property and the war memorial stand today in the Market Place. It was probably demolished when the present property was built. (1). Munns' shop had a remarkable range of goods to sell, as shown by the bill for goods which had been ordered by the housekeeper, gardener and carpenter at Redgrave Hall. With the present rise in the cost of living I am sure many people would love this shop to come back at the prices for goods Charles Munns was charging, especially for rum, brandy and tobacco. The bill was for a seven month period and amounted to £39.3s.0½d. (3 shillings is equal to 15p and $\frac{1}{2}$ d is less than ½p.) This was quite a large amount to be covered by the shopkeeper for the 132 items bought over seven months.

Amongst the items purchased by the housekeeper were night candles and stable candles for the farm, costing four shillings and

two pence, equivalent to about twenty-one pence today. Salt was bought by the basket and vinegar by the gallon for two shillings, just over 10p today. Soap came in three varieties; four pound of brown soap was purchased, seven pound of white soap and one firkin of soft soap, probably bought in a barrel and used for the laundry but was also used for greasing wheel hubs and other purposes. 'Scowering' sand was probably used for cleaning saucepans. Three gallons of Brandy for preserves was £1.4s.0d. (One gallon = 8 pts or 4.5 litres.) One of the most surprising items was tobacco at five shillings and four pence for two pounds. (27p). A gross of pipes, probably the white clay pipes, were purchased for two shillings. One gross is equivalent to 12 dozen or 144). I cannot tell if the tobacco and pipes were for the housekeeper herself or if Thomas Holt provided these for all his servants or farmworkers. We found a lot of broken pipes when we field walked the ploughed fields in Redgrave in the 1990s.

The gardener mainly purchased writing paper. We found several bills for plants bought from nurseries in the Holt Wilson documents; maybe he used the paper for sending in orders. A total of eighteen pounds of tobacco was purchased by the gardener. The only other things he bought were thread and nails. He may have used this for training plants in the walled kitchen garden near to the hall. The carpenter also bought nails and brads, sold by the stone (14 lb). 2.2 lb = I Kg.

A Victorian Dictionary describes a chandler as a tallow candle maker. Tallow was made from animal fats and the smell would have been unpleasant, the gentry would have used wax candles, and tallow would have been used for the servants. John Chandler had property in the marketplace and Christine Chandler had property on the opposite side of the marketplace in 1433 at the same time, so there may have been candle makers in Botesdale at this time.



Memories of Our Farmhouse Kitchen in the '50's

One of my earliest memories is of our kitchen which was the beating heart of the house; it was also a playground for my brother and me. If it was a rainy day the wet washing was hung on permanent strings around the ceiling to dry by the heat of the range cooker. It was where we did our drawing, painting and making as children. Most important though it was where Mother produced all the wonderful food we ate.

Very early in the '50's there was an old black range in a huge inglenook fireplace, I remember melting glue in a black glue pot on the hob when I was doing some "sticking"!

The black range was replaced by a lovely cream Aga in the early fifties and also a large Prestcold American Refrigerator was introduced. Next to the kitchen was the dairy where my Father ! brought in the milk from the house cow that he milked every morning at 6am and then separated it into cream, milk for the house and skim milk for the pet cats we had. I can still imagine the clink of the old separating machine when he turned the handle. The separator had a large bowl-like container on the top which had a new piece of muslin tied over the tube at the bottom of it every morning. The milk was poured in the top and then filtered through the muslin. This was then separated by central fugal force through two pipes, one took thick cream into a bowl and then milk into a large pan for us to use. The skimmed milk passed into another container. This would have been the same as a green top milk today. Dad had a butter churn to turn the cream into delicious yellow butter and made his special pattern on the top of the slabs of butter with his butter pats.

We always had a roast joint for Sunday lunch, mostly beef but lamb, pork, chicken and pheasant sometimes. My job was to make the gravy standing on a stool made by my Grandfather when he was a boy, probably around 1870. Sometimes I lost concentration and lumps of flour appeared in the pan and much stirring and beating had to happen to get them out!

Pudding on a Sunday was usually individual trifles and Dad took pleasure in making them well before lunchtime so that the custard had time to cool and set. There was always a spoonful of thick cream for the top of our trifles.


Monday was usually cold beef, or other cold meat, Tuesday could be Shepherd's pie or Cottage Pie to use up the last of Sunday's joint. These were always so hot, tasty and filling for a cold winter's day. We always had a hot pudding on a weekday, stewed fruit from the orchard with custard, fruit pies and there were many varied ways of eating the fruit which Mum had bottled in the autumn. Other memories include rice or semolina puddings with that lovely brown topping that came from cooking these in the Aga and the flavour of nutmeg. Our main meal was always at lunchtime.

Meat was delivered by Lasts the butchers and Catlins Bakery delivered our bread. Mother went shopping in Bury once a week on a Wednesday and always bought the fish from Whipps fresh fish shop which used to be in Whiting Street.

Fridays was always fish of some sort, plaice, cod, haddock etc., cooked in different ways. I remember a cattle feed salesman turned up just before lunch one day so he was invited to stay for lunch and that day we were going to have fried fillets of fish and that meant

Mum was one fillet short, so she sliced a round of bread off the loaf, cut it into the shape of a fillet of plaice and egg and breadcrumbed it so it looked like a helping of fish; of course she had to make sure she gave it to herself and not the guest!

We did, of course, grow all our own vegetables and soft fruit; there was a large orchard of apple, plum and pear trees. Apples were stored in the apple room, which was a spare bedroom really! Other fruits were bottled and stored in the pantry; domestic freezers hadn't been introduced yet. If there was a glut of vegetables these would be salted and put in large stone jars or glass preserving bottles to store them for later in the year.

I remember all the different jams and preserves that were made and I have the little notebook where Mum recorded all the amounts each year. For example, in 1950 Mum made 70 pounds of jam and marmalade, and she bottled 36 pounds of gooseberries and black currants. From 1961 to 1966 Mum made an extra 140 pounds of Marmalade per year which she sold to raise funds for St. Mary's Church and for the local W.I. Noted in the book are the names of some of the farm employees who gave fruit, Fred, Ephraim and Peter.

Mum grew strawberries which we helped pick and often had at supper time sprinkled with caster sugar and a lovely dollop of thick cream. Black, red and white currants were grown for jams and jellies.

How did Mother find the time to do all this growing, picking, bottling and jam making?

She also grew lettuce, asparagus and celery but not tomatoes. We didn't have a greenhouse - or maybe tomatoes weren't grown in domestic gardens then?

Christmas puddings and jars of mincemeat were made well before Christmas to allow the flavours to develop, and the Christmas Cake was made about a month before Christmas for the same reason. I used to love making the marzipan and putting it and then the icing on the cake a few days before Christmas, these were homemade as there were no packet versions.

These reminiscences were written by someone who prefers to remain anonymous!





IN YOUR GARDEN

What's in store for us gardeners in the coming year? I thought I would reach for my crystal ball to try and predict what to expect. Whilst I certainly do not purport to be a clairvoyant, however a number of topics stand out not least the challenging weather trends experienced last year and similar forecast for this summer if the lack of rainfall recently is anything to go by, plus the ever rising cost of gardening look likely to be equally challenging.

One subject however will dominate. The demise of peat-based compost.

At some time between now and the end of 2024, we will be unable to buy compost containing peat in England as it will become illegal to sell peat-based growing media in garden centres - although there is nothing to stop you from slipping in to Wales or Scotland to stock up!

I am sure I am not alone in wanting to stop using peat based products to save our peatlands but am in a quandary over the mixed results from the alternatives. Last year I had a number of failures with peat-free compost because it behaved very differently to the compost containing peat and the packaging gave no clear instructions on use, especially with reference to watering and feeding. Even respected horticultural experts are sanguine and suggesting we will all have to go through a learning curve as they are not able at this stage to give definitive guidance apart from peat-free is not equal to peat compost and no two brands of peat-free are the same.

Work is going on, helped by research and technology, that hopefully by the time the peat ban is implemented we will have some definitive answers on how to successfully use peat-free compost.

COST SAVINGS

Gardening can be a costly business, especially so at present as the price of everything seems to rise daily and people are trying to scale back on expenditure with the inevitable results - luxuries and hobbies are destined for the chop. Needless to say the thought of giving up gardening is not something I would recommend as it is so beneficial to our physical health and mental well being and if you grow produce, a substantial contributor to the household finances.

However, by using all manner of horticultural thriftiness there are plenty of simple things you can do to be careful with your cash.

Growing vegetable plants from seed is one obvious route and saving seeds from successful and favoured varieties. Dividing perennials and also taking cuttings allows you to create more plants for nothing.

Which brings me back to compost. Every garden can benefit from a compost heap as the contents from a well made one will help your flowers grow more vibrantly and vegetables will really flourish from plenty of your home made 'magic mixture'. Next month, I will cover some tips in creating the 'magic mixture'

Dubai Tower 7

I mentioned in my last note that the contractor for the basement of the tower had also been contracted to build the breakwaters required to protect the Marina.

When finished, the main breakwater was an attractive place for people to walk in the sun, beside the sea. For a time it looked quite magical, with the sun sparking off the ripples that corrugated the surface of the seawater in the basin, but as time passed it became obvious that the water in the basin was not being rejuvenated. Of course, the water level rose and fell with the tides, but there was no circulation in the basin to refresh the enclosed area of water.

The problem was presented to a major UK consultancy with wide experience of such problems, and they proposed a revision to the construction of part of the main breakwater near its mid point, and this was adopted by the owner. Essentially, the core of the breakwater was to be removed down to low water level, and replaced with large, single size, rock pieces so that this section became porous – waves breaking here flowed through the structure instead of being repelled. In effect, the natural wave action pumped water into the basin. The efficacy of this approach quickly became apparent as the smaller boats moored in the basin rapidly swung on their moorings and pointed their bows directly at the more porous section. Replacing the top of the breakwater and walkway was a relatively straightforward task, and people were soon walking along the structure enjoying the view and sunshine, and also the meals provided at the fish restaurant constructed at the round-head at the end of the main breakwater.

XXXXXX

On the island the JV (the Joint Venture second contractor) was very busy preparing for the start of superstructure construction. Approval of suppliers continued, erection of the three construction cranes had been concluded, and an external personnel/small equipment lift had been installed at the base of the tower on each side, amongst other activities.

It was a very busy site!

The contractor intended to construct the superstructure of the Tower using a process known as slip forming, with each individual advance being two storeys high as this was the total height of an individual room. The floors that reduced the overall height of this space by 50%, and provided the bedroom/bathroom area in the room were precast off -site, and craned into position as necessary as the building became taller.

SCAM ALERTS

FALSE DONATION SITES FOR TURKEY EARTHQUAKE VICTIMS

If you are considering donating to victims of the Turkey/Syrian earthquake, be aware scammers have been exploiting the situation via social media postings containing misleading or false information that claim to be collecting funds to aid victims of the recent disaster.

Remember, it can be very hard to tell if an approach is a scam - that's why they work.

To be on the safe side, don't give money to unfamiliar charity accounts on social media as there is no guarantee the donations will reach their intended destination.

ANY CASH REQUESTS VIA MONEY TRANSFER COMPANIES SHOULD SET THE ALARM BELLS RINGING The government advice is, if you wish to donate to the victims of the Turkish earthquake you do so via the *Disasters Emergency Committee*.

In addition, you can always check the bona fide of any UK based charity via the *Fund Raising Regulator's Directory*. Both organisations have websites.

If you have been a victim of a donation scam, contact your bank immediately as they may be able to retrieve the monies or reimburse you. Importantly, report the scam to ACTION FRAUD on 0300 123 2040

FAKE TAX REFUND EMAILS

HMRC have issued a warning about fraudsters sending fake 'tax refund' emails. These dodgy emails use HMRC branding to add legitimacy to the emails that state 'after the latest annual calculations of your fiscal activity, we have determined you are eligible to receive a tax refund'

The email then goes on to tell you the amount you are due and includes an expiration date to urge you to act quickly and press the 'claim now' button. This takes you to a phony website where the scammers will phish for your personal financial details.

HMRC will never send specific personal tax information such as how much you owe or any rebates you are entitled to by email.

If you receive such an email message, you can be sure it is a scam.


