THE PROMISE OF HARVEST

'Promises, promises.' It's a phrase that I'm sure we have all used. It rolls off the tongue when someone tells you they will do something, but you don't really believe them. My wife has been on at me for ages to sort out my massive collection of vinyl records, (I must have every seven inch single released between about 1983 and 1999.) I aim to move them from boxes under the bed, into a cupboard near a birthday present of a turntable. So a few weeks back I said I would do it by the end of the summer holidays. To which she replied, "Promises, promises."

We make promises a lot in life. Just recently I had the pleasure of taking a wedding, during which the happy couple promised to love, comfort, honour and respect each other. If you still use cash, then when you pay with a bank note, on the front of the note you hand over it says, 'I promise to pay the bearer on demand the sum of x pounds.'

At the beginning of October at Parkview we shall be celebrating Harvest. There was a time when Harvest was one of the great village festivals. A celebration of the gathering in of the crops, including a Harvest supper, and dancing and merrymaking. Harvest was something shared by a whole community. (This year Parkview will be celebrating with our annual Harvest Thanksgiving Service followed by a shared lunch! I can't promise dancing!). And while many churches across the country will be doing the same around this time, I do think that in Suffolk, being one of the biggest farming counties in the U.K., Harvest has an extra-special meaning. But what's the connection between Harvest and promises? Well Harvest reminds me of a promise that God gives us.

The Bible is full of promises that God offers us, nearly seven and half thousand of them. At least one of those promises refers to harvest time. Right at the beginning of the Bible, in Genesis, at the end of chapter 8, God says this: 'As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease.'

I have lived in Suffolk pretty much all of my life, apart from, I'm embarrassed to say, five years living in Norfolk. But I am a Suffolk boy. So you would think I should know a little about farming, harvest time etc. Well, I know that farmers work incredibly hard, over long hours. I also know what a tractor is, and a combine. But I'm ashamed to say that I don't know much more.

But I do know that these promises from God, including a harvest, will never cease until we reach the land that we are promised as believers, heaven. I do think we should be thankful for all those who work hard to provide that harvest for us. That goes for farmers of course, but also anyone else involved in the process of getting food to our plates. Whether that be in a food processing factory, or in a distribution centre, or maybe you are a delivery driver, or perhaps you work in retail, or a foodbank, indeed anywhere in that chain. As someone who simply cooks food and then eats it, can I say thank you to anyone who is a part of that process. I also think we should thank God for the harvest. In fact I believe we should say thank you to God for all that we have to eat and drink, every time we sit at the table.

Promises, promises. We use the phrase when we don't really believe what someone says. But I fully believe in the promises that God offers us. And in my experience, he hasn't let me down yet.

God's promises never fail. I hope one day you will find that to be true.

Report from the September 2023 Botesdale PC Meeting

Eight members of the Parish Council were present for the meeting and there were no members of the public.

Planning: The PC had no objection to an application for works to remove a holly tree at Willow Weavers, Fen Lane.

Correspondence: Mid Suffolk District Council (MSDC) has notified us of a new grant available to work with communities in cleaning up neighbourhoods and building local pride. The PC will apply for funding for sign cleaning/refurbishment.

MSDC has opened applications for the 2024 scheme to fund tree planting initiatives – street trees, a copse or an avenue; small community woods; hedgerows – both new and improving existing ones, especially where they helped bridge gaps in the landscape; and community or scattered orchards. The PC has passed the information on to Barwoods but other organisations are welcome to apply directly to MSDC at www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/environment/planting-schemes/treeshedgerows-and-wildflowers-scheme/.

Sadly our Suffolk Police Community Engagement Officer, Stefan Henriksen, is moving to a new position. We thank him for his years of support.

The PC has supported a number of PIIP applications up to now and was sad not to be able to support works to the roof at St Mary's Rickinghall Inferior due to the Local Government Act 1894 which prohibits parish councils giving funds to churches. There is an amendment to the current Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill which aims to change this after which the PC can consider future applications.

The PC had an informal meeting in August where councillors were able to discuss community engagement and involvement, and the future of the parish council and the village. At the September meeting it was agreed to update the 2003 Village Appraisal with new community consultation, update the introduction to the village in the Welcome Pack and publish councillor bios on the website in the coming months.

Past sessions have seen good attendance from the public and it is an opportunity to ask questions or tender compliments and complaints. At the August session, the two Chairs had a useful discussion with Gordon Lawrence, the organiser of the Community Bus about the barriers to the Parish Councils funding the purchase of a new bus. At present, there are just two options which will allow the parish councils to legally fund a new bus: if Rickinghall PC remains the owner of a new bus (as it does the present bus) or for the Community Bus scheme to be established as a separate legal entity such as a charity. District Cllr Morgan has agreed to help the Community Bus team investigate options with the MSDC legal team.



We hope that, despite some indifferent weather, you have been able to take full advantage of the Recreation Ground over the Summer. It has been very pleasing to see the vision for the regenerated site come to life as people of all ages enjoyed the wide variety of facilities on offer. Our thanks to the many visitors who, along with our band of volunteers, have clearly taken pride in the new facilities and helped to keep it litter free and a welcoming place to visit.

We promised from the outset that the Recreation Ground would not stand still. Over the next few weeks, we will be extending the capacity of the Junior Swing (to meet demand!), extending the Willow Tunnel, installing a new Circular Bench beyond the Health and Fitness Suite and adding a "Chatty Bench" for those who want to sit, take in the surroundings and chat.

If you have enjoyed the facilities on offer, you might feel that you want to take advantage of the dedications on the Picture Frame Seat. See https://botesdale.onesuffolk.net/news/view/16 for details.

We are pleased, and very proud, to announce that the Recreation Ground has been recognised with an award in the Community and Schools category by the annual British Association of Landscape Industries national and international project review. The Judges visited the site and were very impressed with the Project.

Redgrave Parish Council



Parish Council Report – September 2023 By Alison Spouncer, Parish Clerk

No meeting was held in August. September's meeting had apologies from three Councillors. We were very pleased to welcome Cllr Fleming along with five members of the public. District Cllr Morgan sent her apologies.

County Councillor Reports

Norwich to Tilbury Pylon Line – Discussions are ongoing. Cllr Fleming asked that anyone wishing to comment to contact herself and/or Jo Churchill MP (jo.churchill.mp@parliament.uk).

LionLink Interconnector Line possibly into Walberswick – A National Grid Ventures project with the potential for landfall at Walberswick. There is a non-statutory consultation on National Grid Venture's LionLink Project from 8th September to 3rd November 2023. There have been some comments regarding this project in respect of the major Norwich to Tilbury plans also involving Suffolk.

Major Planning/Shepherd's Grove, Stanton – Application DC/23/1154/OUT has a deadline of 11th October for comments. Whilst Cllr Fleming acknowledged it will not directly affect Redgrave, the potential increased traffic load will be noticed alongside concerns regarding water use, contamination, and severe fire risk.

Public Forum

Redgrave's Tree Warden requested volunteers for end of October/November timeframe to plant tree saplings as replacements for those lost due to the two last summers. More details to follow on the Green Redgrave Group Facebook page and village noticeboard. Any help would be most welcome, thank you.

A representative from Redgrave Amenities Trust (RAT) was present to discuss the complaint received about the RAT's governance and transparency. The RAT representative stated that it had not received the complaint directly so had been unable to address the contents. Cllr Warnes stated that, as per his email on the topic, the complainant was the Redgrave Parish Council (RPC). He provided a brief overview of the timeline starting with the complainant making contact and seeking the Redgrave Parish Council's (RPC) help in acting on their behalf. Following a review of the complaint the RPC had agreed to undertake some of the points with the RAT with subsequent communications made by the RPC to the RAT on the matter. The three points agreed by the RPC to pursue were:

1.The illegal appointment of Trustees. The RPC is designated as the Appointing Authority to three Charities: Redgrave Amenities Trust, Charity for the Needy and Poor and the Little Ouse Headwaters Project. The complaint noted that appointment of Trustees to the RAT had not been undertaken in accordance with the charities' Governing Documents.

2.The lack of access of the playing field in Churchway for Parishioners with no notice or discussion by the RAT.

3.Change of the Governance Document without consulting Parishioners (the beneficiaries of the Charity).

The lack of access to the playing field has become a separate issue following three other communications received from concerned Parishioners.

The RAT representative stated that the fencing of the land has been undertaken as a requirement of the lease to be signed with the landowner (Llanover); he noted that gating of the car park had been undertaken to prevent unauthorised use by contractors and other drivers. He stated that the playing area/football pitch remained available to the public. This last statement was disputed by Cllr Warnes, noting that the RPC had had sight of email correspondence from Llanover stating that the land was now to be a "private football club"; as no information had been received from the RAT as to the contents of the lease it was assumed that this statement reflected reality. The RPC requested sight of the lease and liaison with Redgrave parishioners prior to its signature. The RAT Representative stated that this was not possible as he had not seen it. Cllr Warnes asked how it was possible that the RAT had undertaken work required by the lease, which excluded parishioners from the land, without having seen the lease; no answer was given.

The RAT representative raised a complaint for the RPC to consider regarding dog faeces being left on the footpath and the playing field. The RPC would take up the issue on the footpaths, but that, as the playing field was private land, it was for RAT to consider its actions for that land. RAT confirmed it would be considering actions relating to trespass with police involvement if required.

Planning

One new application was received:

DC/23/03648 – Gressingham Foods Ltd, Hinderclay Road, Redgrave, Diss, Suffolk IP22 1SA – Application to determine if Prior Approval is required for a proposed Change of Use of Agricultural Buildings to Dwellinghouses (C3) and for building operations reasonably necessary for conversion. Town and Country Planning (General Permitted Development) (England) Order 2015 (as amended). Schedule 2 Part 3, Class Q – Conversion of agricultural building into 5no. dwellings (deadline of 24th August 2023). No objections were provided.

All applications, updates and comments are available online for review and comment via the Mid-Suffolk District Council planning portal at https://www.midsuffolk.gov/planning/application-search-and-comment/

The Financial Report was provided to Councillors and agreed, with details of payments also listed in the agenda for information. No monies received, with payments totalling £1,958.75 between 6th July and 7th September (full details available within the minutes (found on the village noticeboard and the website).

Ongoing Items:

The <u>directional sign opposite Half Moon Lane</u> on the B1113 has been reported to Suffolk Highways (SH). Reference number 00414306.

The RPC CEO PC Stefan Henriksen is being redeployed to Halesworth as of December 2023 with no current replacement at Stowmarket. Further information is anticipated nearer the time as to the contact arrangements the Parish will have for liaison with the Police. RPC will follow up to attempt to establish how the link to the Police will work in the future.

The <u>dog litter bin on The Green</u> was agreed to be needing more capacity following a comment from a resident. The RPC is in possession of another bin and will arrange to have it placed next to the current one to help alleviate the issue

Further discussion was held on the issue of the improper appointment of trustees to charities. Cllr Warnes outlined two options for the Council to consider. Firstly, the RPC could decide that it no longer wanted to appoint Trustees to the three Charities and wished to relinquish its role as the Appointing Authority. Secondly, the RPC could decide to continue as Appointing Authority for the three Charities. The Council expressed concerns for the individuals who have not been appointed in accordance with the requirements of their respective Governing Documents, which legally means they could be held personally and financially liable for decisions they take. The RPC noted that it had a duty of care to ensure individuals are not kept in such a precarious situation and to regularise the situation regarding the proper appointment of trustees for the benefit of the village at large. The option to continue as Appointing Authority to the three Charities was proposed and seconded and unanimously voted upon.

There may be a need for an Extraordinary Parish Council Meeting to agree the Trustee Appointment policy document and next steps, and to allow residents to hear the proposals. Details will be made available if required.

Rickinghall Parish Council Report September 2023 by Cllr Andrew Gordon

Rickinghall Parish Council Meeting took place on Thursday 7 September with apologies from Parish Cllr Sally Smith, and District Cllr Gilly Morgan and County Cllr Jessica Fleming. Matters which may be of interest to Rickinghall residents included:

Public Forum

The meeting was attended by Mr Martin Last, the planning agent for the yet-to-be commenced development of 41 homes behind Greenacres, off Garden House Lane (for which planning permission has been obtained). He shared with the meeting early plans:

- 1. to extend Greenacres, the extension to fall within permitted development rules;
- 2. for a new separate bungalow next to Greenacres, sited between Greenacres and the footpath planning permission yet to be submitted;
- 3. early proposals for a northward extension of the Garden House Lane development to include 11 or so single-story retirement bungalows and a single-storey block of 16 retirement apartments, managed with on-site care, the development (if built) to include green spaces and car parking.

The meeting was grateful of first sight of these proposals, noting that they were at an early, pre application, stage. The meeting discussed issues relating to the implications for traffic movement on Garden House Lane, the potential loss of wildlife habitat, affordability, the demographic need and impact on Rickinghall of dwellings dedicated to over-55s, and the implications for the Neighbourhood Plan.

A request was made for attention to be paid to the drainage ditch that flows in front of Greenacres, which floods in heavy weather. Mr Last promised to attend to this as part of the work on Greenacres.

Planning Applications

The meeting noted applications regarding Tudor Lodge, Kiln Rise, Garden House Lane, to replace a raised deck – no objection – and Stanley Cottage, Bury Road, for work to prune a yew tree – also no objection.

It noted withdrawal of applications for Greyhound Inn for internal works to include the creation of a two-storey dwelling.

Finally, the following decisions were noted: Park Lodge, Rectory Hill, DC approval of a singlestorey side and rear extension; Lamorna Cottage, tree works;

The Rosery, St George's Drive, tree works (DC approved);

The Uplands, The Street, construction of a new workshop/potting shed and outbuilding, (DC approved);

Tudor Oak Cottage, The Street, tree works; The Uplands, The Street, tree works, The Old Four Horseshoes, The Street, tree works;

Redwings, Rectory Hill, tree works; Ash Tree House, Fen Lane, tree works.

Correspondence

MSDC: To note a new grant available to further work with communities in cleaning up neighbourhoods and building local pride; MSDC: To note that applications are open for the 2024 scheme to fund tree planting; Suffolk Police: To note that our current Community Engagement Officer Stefan Henriksen is moving to a new position - we have no news regarding his successor; Resident: To consider a request to remove six 'Tree of Heaven' trees (Ailanthus altissima); Parkview Chapel: to note thanks from the Chapel for PIIP funding for youth club equipment.

General Items

A question was raised regarding the bottle bank sited next to the Co-Op. This site is frequently used to dump plastic bags full of bottles, with no effort made to put the bottles in the bins. Please note that this is fly tipping, a criminal offence.

Water quality in Botesdale Brook (locally known in

In mid-July there was a considerable amount of orange/brownish material floating in the river at the bridge in Fen Lane. Some residents were concerned that it had the appearance of sewage. I collected some of the pieces and examined them under a microscope. They were largely masses of filamentous algae which occur commonly in garden ponds and are widely known as blanket weed. The confusion arises because of the brown deposits which attach to the algae. It was clear that it was not faeces (and it had no smell!).

The brown- and orange-coloured deposits that are seen in this part of the river and elsewhere are a natural occurrence and give the impression that there has been pollution. The scientific explanation is that in an environment where oxygen levels are low and there is dissolved iron in the ground water, iron-oxidising bacteria metabolise the oxygen in soluble iron (ferrous) hydroxide causing the iron to change to an insoluble (ferric) form which precipitates as an orange/brown sludge. The Botesdale Brook is fed by many springs that in some cases contain dissolved iron. An example is the spring-fed ditch that feeds into the stream beside the bridge. The brown/ orange iron staining is often apparent at this point. On occasions there is an apparent sheen on the water surface that can be mistaken for oil; this effect is also due to the iron-oxidising bacteria. An easy test is to stir the water with a stick and if bacteria are responsible the sheen separates, if oil was present it would reform as a slick. The high incidence of algae (blanket weed) in the brook is unwelcome as it suggests eutrophication, a process that occurs when there is an excess of nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphate in the water. The algae thrive on the nutrient-rich water and block the natural sunlight. In consequence, the oxygen level in the water is depleted. This has a wide-ranging effect on the aquatic life in the river. As a child I can remember catching sticklebacks but sadly these have been seen infrequently in recent years.

Notes from the Green Redgrave Group (GRG)

What a strange year! Weather all over the place and yet all of the vibes are that we are in for the hottest year globally on record. The saving grace for us here in Redgrave is that the 4,000 trees that we planted in the winter seem to be doing pretty well thanks to the prolonged period of rain in July and the early part of August. Some deer damage to our young apple trees but other than that most seem to be fine; hopefully not too many of them will have been damaged by the heat of our Indian Summer in early September. It will be really interesting to see if the Miyawaki planting technique that we used leads to a super micro-forest in a few years' time.

We mentioned the Suffolk Green Cluster in our last couple of magazine inserts. We are continuing with this. One thing that we are looking at is sustainable food production. To that end we are looking at creating new orchards in the area together with the iFarm initiative in Blo Norton (see https://www.facebook.com/iFarm.norfolk/) and are currently making an application to the Tree Council for some 100 fruit trees as the first part of the project. These first orchards will not be in the Redgrave Parish but we are looking for sites on which we can site more orchards or similar community farm initiatives with the Suffolk Green Cluster partners including iFarm and the Wild Heritage Suffolk CIS (https://www.wildheritagesuffolk.com/). If you know of any likely sites that we can rent then please get in touch.

Hopefully many of you took part in the UK's Big Butterfly Count back in July and managed to spot lots of butterflies (https://bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org/about). If you did then we would be very pleased to hear of your results.

We have been busy trying to create a wildflower meadow in the Old School Playing Field next to the new children's playground. We have just dropped some green hay on it from the Green Hinderclay wildflower meadow (many thanks to them for supplying it), and we are hopeful that it will start to look a bit more interesting in the coming years.

We are also now starting to think about additional projects for the autumn. We already have nearly one thousand trees ready to plant out, probably in October, and will likely have more in due course. Modest by last year's planting marathon, but we will be looking for volunteers to assist. We also have a pond to renovate; more details to follow.

We will shortly be restarting our series of Green Redgrave talks to be held in the All Saints Church in Redgrave. We held the first of these with a talk by Brian Gibb of the iFarm in Blo Norton on Tuesday 5 Sep 23. He gave a very interesting introduction to the work that they do at the iFarm and the benefits to the community, particularly combating isolation and growing food communally. The next talk will be held in the All Saints Church in Redgrave at 7pm on Tuesday 3 Oct 23; Simon Hooton will then be

giving a talk on 'Trees Woods and people'. And in November Kit Grey-Wilson will be giving a talk on creating wildflower meadows. They should all be fascinating. Keep an eye on our Facebook site for more details (https://www.facebook.com/groups/3191728757769842/)

Community Woodland

Writing this at the beginning of September, in a heat wave, it is difficult to remember how different the weather was a couple of weeks ago. What a strange summer we have had.

At last, Low Meadow is shaping up as planned, with the grouped shrubs expanding and joining up, and the central area primarily grass with wildflowers. There were more wildflowers in August than I have seen before, which is encouraging. At the end of the month the grass was cut and cleared off the wildflower area. One of the new black poplars has died but the other is doing well. The Ramseys (neighbours) have planted a rowan in a gap in the hedge adjoining their property. It will complement the rowan that was planted *in memoriam* a long time ago.

There is a lot of wood(willow) stacked under the trees. If anyone has a use for it, please help yourselves.

Northfield Wood is looking more mature now and it is great to see people using the paths. There are apples to pick (they ripen at different times, so choose carefully) and later quinces and medlars. Just leave a few for somebody else!

This is also the time for fruit in Millers Orchard. It was once someone's garden and the fruit trees are still there.

We managed to have an Annual Meeting in September. Some people were unable to attend but we got through the business of the group, which needs to be done regularly. We were pleased to see Ann Topham there – another eager tree planter.



Club News



The July meeting of The Heritage Circle took the form of a talk by Georgette Vale who played the part of the Widow of Robert Kett, a butcher and tanner of Wymondham, who led a rebellion against The Enclosure Act in 1549. There was discontent all over the

country about the high prices and the Enclosure Act and marches took place in many villages.

Robert Kett agreed to lead a march of 16,000 men who tore down fences as they passed through villages on their way to Norwich. They camped on Mousehold Heath. A battle took place on Bishopsgate bridge which was won by Kett, who was then in command of Norwich, and demanded a fair deal for everyone. Several other battles took place. The largest of which was Dussingdale, where 3,000 men died. A herald was sent from the King offering a pardon for everyone, except Robert Kett.

Kett was captured and taken to the Tower of London. He was tried for treason, and was hanged. His body was displayed from the wall of Norwich Castle. He was buried in an unmarked grave.

Devils and Disguises

The August meeting of The Heritage Circle was a talk by Kate Jewell entitled *Devils and Disguises*. Her talk told the history of medieval drama in Bury St. Edmunds and beyond. In York, on Corpus Christi day, 50 plays were performed in various locations throughout the city. The plays told the history of the human race, Christianity and the New Testament. They were intended to convey the idea to people who were mainly illiterate to think about their lives. In Bury St. Edmunds, in 1197, a drunken mob rioted in the Abbey grounds during a performance. The Abbot threatened to ex-communicate them, and all plays were banned.

Another example of medieval drama was the ceremony of the boy bishop. A choir boy acted the part of a bishop for one day, wearing a specially made costume. Sweets were given to children who could then exchange them for coins.

Mummers, led by John Lydgate, toured the country. Wearing disguises, they performed plays about the scriptures related to moral problems. East Anglia was a very active area for performances, with plays taking place often in the market place and held in the round. Moral messages to people were also conveyed by Doom paintings. A good example can be seen in Wenhaston church. The idea was to show people the contrasts of Heaven and Hell, and guide them away from sin.



Nyall's Notes LOHP Local News

The nature of Jesus Christ has been debated endlessly down through the ages. The early church used the words, "100% God and 100% man." To most people that sounds like 200% and they don't see it as very useful. I don't find it all that useful. I believe it was Cliff Richard who solved the problem by saying that Jesus was "God in a body"

John, the chap who wrote the Gospel, referred to himself as 'the disciple that Jesus loved.' He thought of himself as closer to Jesus that any one and might well have described his relationship in today's English as "the best of mates."

Way back in the Old Testament Isaiah describes a vision of God that he had. He says, "I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple. Above him stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. And one called to another and said: 'Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!' And the foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him who called, and the house was filled with smoke."

He uses a Hebrew word for God almighty when he says that he saw him on his throne. The angelic creatures cover their faces and declare "Holy, holy, holy is YHWH." YHWH, usually pronounced Yahweh, was the personal name of God that the Jews hardly dare say. Using the word holy three times puts extreme emphasis on it. Isaiah saw the power and holiness of YHWH, the God almighty, the maker of heaven and earth who rules the universe.

John, in his Gospel, refers to this passage in Isaiah for he quotes actual words from it and, speaking of Jesus, he says, "Isaiah said these things because he saw his glory and spoke of him."

It isn't exactly normal for someone to think of themselves as the best of mates with someone they see as Yahweh, the almighty God, the holy, holy one. I think in that we can see something of the reason that theologians have debated the nature of Jesus so much.

Perhaps 'the best of mates' is being too flippant but I have used it to emphasize the fact that, in Jesus, we can have a very close love relationship with the one who is indeed almighty God yet became the crucified 'God in a body' that we might look at the cross and each individually say, "That proves that, in dying for me. I am the one Jesus loves."

"We have been sanctified (made holy) through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

St Hebrews Ch 10 v. 10



Conservation & Community

"Behold the fleeting swallow Forsakes the frosty air; And leaves alert to follow, Are falling everywhere, Like wounded birds, too weak A distant clime to seek."

Mists in the early morning, and nights are drawing in.....that'll be October then! Over the last few weeks, I've seen rows of swallows on the overhead wires getting ready to migrate to Africa. Young warblers and tits, moulting into adult plumage, will be searching the trees and hedges for insects.

Uncut hedgerows will be brimming with sloes, haws and berries, perfect fodder for hungry migrants such as fieldfares and redwings arriving from Scandinavia.

Young hedgehogs will be trying to find enough food to reach at least 400g in weight. Below this, they are unlikely to survive the winter, so if you are a hedgehog feeder, well, you know the drill! Various types of fungi should be plentiful but do pick with caution! September's blackberries were spectacular this year so if you haven't picked yet, be quick!

We will be starting the huge task of cutting and clearing New Fen in Thelnetham (with some help from our friends at SWT). The flora was wonderful this year, so once it's all cleared we can't wait to see what happens there next year. On Broomscot Common in Garboldisham, volunteers have been working hard for the second year to clear invasive, non-native Australian/New Zeland Pygmyweed (Crassula helmsii) from the new pond. This may take several years to eradicate so, sadly, the pond will have to remain closed off.

We will be holding our annual Fungi Walk at the end of October/ beginning of November. More details will be available on our website closer to the time: www.lohp.org.uk.

So, as we slip towards Winter, why not get out on the sites and enjoy the trees in all their Autumn beauty.



Sunshine after the wettest, wildest winter since the world began was needed but nothing far-flung, fast, furious or weird. A new cultural experience was required too I thought whilst leafing through a travel brochure. What happens in Madeira?

During the afternoon small, nearby shops manned by smiling vendors were found. Yes. Nowadays you are expected to create a postcard-plus- message on y' smartphone but those Madeira cards with colours and shapes like old, stained glass windows seemed worthy items.

"Obligada," said a shop assistant on completing the sale!
Next morning we visited the Mercardo dos Lavradores where
a florist wearing national costume was as colourful as her
merchandise. Em, another holidaymaker, wanted to see the
adjoining fish market. So we wandered through the crowds into a
vast hall. A heap of black, patent leather belts with large eyes and
rows of pointed white teeth lying across a marble slab brought
pictures of medieval Devils to mind! Em took photos whilst I,
wondering whether to laugh or cry at a swordfish with its nose cut
off, turned to admire the painted wall tiles instead. Food at the hotel
was varied, hot and tasty but tempting also was the scent of coffee
and baking bread that drifted early morning from a nearby café.

Eastwards I discovered a trace of old Madeira in the shape of an elegant, detached, eighteenth century mansion. The residence would, probably, have stood sentinel over a vineyard before the vigorous development of tourism enabled the building of many hotels. Who could blame the Madeirans? Their craggy terrain is not suited to our heavy, modern means of mechanical cultivation.

Troupes of wild cats populated the coastline that is, randomly, speared with cacti, branched with pine, braced with undulating walls of volcanic rock. I descended via a precipitous, zig-zagging path to an outcrop that overhung the sea and tried to capture dawn's atmospheric effects with crayons and sketchpad. Waves kept catching the sunlight and letting it go.

Em, so she said at supper, had taken a tour round the island's beauty spots. That night much to everyone's amusement she tried to persuade our young and handsome waiter to dance with her.

"Sorry but I working," he said.

So what is special about Madeira besides the strong, good looking natives and sunshine, as if that is not enough? Is it unlike any other place with an oceanic climate and tropical influences? The answer did not occur to me until I was home unpacking souvenirs including a giant seed pod. What pleased me so much was the fact that you could hardly go anywhere outside on foot unless you were willing to climb. Therefore, the result was a most relaxing holiday because in mountainous Madeira I was discouraged from continuing the pyretic pace of everyday.

"Much obliged" or "Obligada", as they say in Portuguese.

10 things you may not know about Rickinghall Village Hall

- It's an independent Registered Charity, not in any way connected to the Parish Council
- 2. It's managed and operated entirely by unpaid volunteers from our village for the benefit of us all
- 3. It raises all its own funds
- It gets money from the bottle banks on Snape Hill and the payment made is by weight, so lots of bottles please!
- 5. It also gets money from the textile and paper banks at the Hall most from the textiles
- 6. Has to pay for the hire and emptying of the waste skip from its own funds so no fly tipping please
- 7. It is an important social and activity centre for many residents of Rickinghall and surrounding villages. It is hired some 500 times each year
- 8. Some 10% of income comes from events organised and run by the Hall Management Committee itself, these are the Country Market, Autojumble & Classic Car Meet, the Village Hall Lottery and Christmas Craft Fair. This figure has dropped from 40% as we no longer have the volunteers to run an annual jumble sale and fireworks party
- The Village Hall was originally a Nissen hut, which was bricked round and much extended over the years
- 10. The car park is for users of the Hall and its facilities. If others want to use it they need to ask – we'll normally say yes if it's not going to cause problems for hirers
- 11. We continually strive to improve the facilities. Current projects are: Replace leaking skylights to keep the hall water tight; install a solar photo voltaic panel and battery system to reduce our reliance on expensive mains electricity; replace external woodwork with plastic to reduce maintenance costs; the car park needs two potholes repairing and ideally have the surface re-dressed with chippings to extend the life of the car park and we have registered our interest with Suffolk County Council for the installation of electric vehicle charging points
- 12. Okay, 12 things then! It's been the centre of the community since 1937, and it continues to be so

You may or may not make use of the hall and its facilities yourself, but it is your village hall. Would you like to be part of this success story?? Three very active members retired from the management committee during the last couple of years and another has retired recently. The remaining members are striving to keep things going and would welcome more people on board to share the tasks. Do you think you could help - not necessarily on the committee, but become one of the hall's band of active supporters? Your skills are a valuable asset and could be used to benefit your community.

Memories - At school By Pat Hubbard (née Hill)

I was born in Rickinghall in 1942 in a cottage down Water Lane, and was delivered by Nurse Farnish – she came out in all weathers. I lived with my parents, Olive and Jack, and my brother Brian who was 5 years older than me.

I remember going to Rickinghall School. I liked all the teachers – I think Mrs Phillips was my favourite teacher; she always wore a twinset and pearls. I wasn't rebellious at school although once I

did push a boy called Derek Lummis down the slope from the playing field and he grazed his knee. His mother complained and I got into trouble for that.

I didn't like maths - especially mental arithmetic. My favourite part of school was making up stories and writing composition. I still love making up stories, in my head, especially when I can't get to sleep at night. I used to make up poems about Nature and send them to the Diss Express and they got published in the paper. Mr Compton, a teacher at the school, organised an Art Competition and an Art Master came from Eye to judge the entries. I painted a picture of Anne Boleyn and won first prize although I can't remember what I received.

The school dinners were lovely. There was Mrs Markham, Mrs Lusby and Mrs Bishop over the years – all really good school cooks. Their mash and stews were wonderful. One day the cook came in to the classroom and asked if she could have some girls to help in the kitchen to top and tail the gooseberries needed for dinner. Valerie Powell and I ate so many we had terrible tummy aches. Also, my dad grew potatoes at home in the garden and supplied the school with them for the dinners.

I was in the school netball team with my friends. The orange segments, at half time, were a real treat. I cannot remember which schools we played our matches against but I do remember going as far as Debenham on one occasion. I think we went with the school football team and travelled on a Simond's bus.

I went to the church Sunday School. We were given a sticker each time we went to put in a special book – it may have been to record attendance. Sunday School outings were good. I remember going to Gt Yarmouth. My mum whitened my plimsolls and she bought me blue and white ankle socks. I loved them. I went with Valerie and Margaret Powell. It was a good time.

My mother picked strawberries in the summer to earn a little

extra. She also cleaned the Upper Church. Dad worked for Barker's at Kiln Farm, just down the road from our house. My dad worked on the farm and as a farm lorry driver. Sometimes Dad and Albert, his brother, had to drive produce to the London markets and would be away for two nights but usually he rarely went out of the village!

Mr Knights was the farm manager for Barkers at Kiln Farm and his grandson, James, came to stay at the farm each summer. James lived in Jersey and when he was over, he and I played in the Marl Pit which was just up the road from my home on the other side of Water Lane. There were 'caves' up the sides of the Marl Pit and big trees grew all over it, so we played Tarzan and Jane and swung from the branches and hid in the caves and had a wonderful time. We also played Cowboys and Indians. The Dutch Barn on the farm was often full of straw bales and we made wonderful dens to play in. We got the ideas for our games from the Pictures shown at the Village Hall on Wednesday and Saturday nights. Our favourites were Tarzan and Jane. Cowboys and Indians and Flash Gordon. We didn't have TV in those days - not many people in Rickinghall did. We also played in the Kell which was forbidden because that was where the boar was kept. We didn't take any notice. It was like a forest to us – we played in the trees and made Tarzan noises and I don't think we ever saw the boar.

Dad was one of 9 children. His sister, Aunt Bessie, lived at Allwood Green. She was said to be able to charm away warts. She said to rub raw meat on the wart and then bury the meat in the garden. I never knew if it worked.

I worked at Wattisfield Pottery when I first left school and then got a job as a proof reader at the Bury Free Press.

I married Peter in 1964 at the Lower Church. The Rev Cotton took the service. Sheila Perry, Margaret Powell and my 2 year old niece, Jackie were my bridesmaids. They wore midnight satin dresses.

My husband and I spent 39 lovely years living at our house in Wattisfield before we moved to







SCAM ALERT

It can be very difficult spotting a spoof website as fraudsters are skilled at creating sites that cleverly mimic the branding of Government departments, organisations and national retailers.

From dodgy investment 'opportunities' to manipulating vulnerable people into fake relationships, these criminals are always looking to exploit unsuspecting victims.

So be on your guard to the latest scams doing the rounds locally.

Cost of living payments

Trading Standards have alerted us to fake text messages claiming to be from HM government offering a £899 Cost of Living payment.

The link in the text directs you to a phishing website that will ask you for personal information and your bank details for confirmation to action your cost of living payment. Sadly, this is a scam. The sole purpose is to glean personal and financial information to perpetrate fraudulent use.

All cost of living payments are sent out automatically and directly to those eligible and you do not need to apply to, or contact, the Government.

Council Tax refund

Reports are being received of residents receiving telephone cold calls claiming to be from the local authority advising they are 'in the wrong council tax band' and requests for bank account details so they can receive 'a refund' These calls are from fraudsters. If you receive one. Hang up.

Wilco copycat websites

Opportunist scammers are seeking to capitalise on the Wilco stores administration situation via spurious websites on Facebook promising huge discounts. These offer links to phony Wilco copycat websites that phish for your personal information and bank details. These ads claim there is limited stock available so you must act immediately to grab your 'bargain of a lifetime'


