A Letter

from

Rural Dean Rev Susan Loxton

First an update on the parishes of RBR

We have had meetings with the benefice of North Hartismere, which is the next benefice to us, which has 6 parishes. Both RBR and North Hartismere are struggling to pay their parish share.

For those of you who are not aware of how Church of England churches are financed; each parish /benefice must pay its own way – housekeeping bills such as energy, insurance, maintenance, and there is a charge from the diocese to pay for administration, staff, Stipendiary ministers, training etc. As our diocese is quite young (100 years), it does not have lots of property or land to make money from so the budget relies heavily on the parishes. The parishes pay their bills plus repairs etc., through local fundraising and donations. The congregations give money to the church, but many are of retirement age and so have a static income and of course costs have gone up in the last few years. All of which means that most of our parish churches are struggling.

By joining these two benefices together we will look for one Stipendiary Priest to oversee the work and worship of the parishes. One person cannot do it all, so we are trying to build a team to work alongside the new incumbent. We already have some 'retired' priests who have permission to officiate, we have a lay reader, and some lay elders, who will be part of the ministry team alongside a self-supporting minister who has a day job but is ministering in the parishes, taking some Sunday services, and we will look to train some more lay elders to help with pastoral work and leading some services and other events. We believe by joining forces it will create some new energy and the burden of the parish share will be less.

The parishes are busy working on parish profiles to send out to candidates for the post, we should be ready to advertise soon after Easter.

I will update you when we know more.

March musings

We are in the season of Lent, a time in the church where we traditionally have no flowers, colours are purple, and it is a more solemn time in church as we ponder the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness after his baptism.

Lent is 40 days (not including Sundays as every Sunday we celebrate Jesus rising from the dead!). Many people practise a partial fast; some give up chocolate, biscuits, some give up watching so much TV and social media. Others take things on; reading a book to help us think through the events of Lent and Easter or daily readings, or spending time each day in quiet contemplation trying to connect with God. Still others put money aside remembering those who do not have enough to eat or fresh water, and at the end of Lent donating to a charity. Some people try to do an act of kindness every day.... the list goes on.

However, as I was thinking about my reflection for Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, I was struck by some words in the Old Testament where God's people are complaining saying, we fasted but you did not answer our prayers. God answers, you are fasting if for your own profit and he goes on to tell them the kind of fast he requires. You can find it in Isaiah 58, The Message translation is great because it packs a punch.

So here is God's idea of fasting:

- Get rid of unfair practices.
- Stop gossiping.
- Stop fighting.
- Be generous with those in need.
- Where you can help fight injustice.
- Feed the hungry, clothe the poor.
- And finally, be available for your family.

Whether you are a person of faith or not, these practices are a great way of making a difference for good. Lent lasts until Easter Sunday, so we have some time to practise, and this Lent could be the start of some good, holy habits!







Pharmacy Reforms Bring New Services To The High Street

Patients may be aware of the Pharmacy First Service.

One of several Pharmacies in Diss HADO 66 Mount Street Diss IP22 4QQ 01379 644001 has been checked and offers the Pharmacy First Service

This Service is where Pharmacists provide advice and NHS funded treatment, where clinically appropriate, for the seven common conditions set out below.

Sinusitis Sore Throat Earache Infected insect bite Impetigo Shingles

Uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women.

Consultations for these seven conditions will be provided to Patients presenting to a Community Pharmacy as well as those referred by 111. This will enable the management of common infections by Community Pharmacies through offering self-care, advice, and supplying certain over the counter and prescription only medicines (where clinically appropriate) via National protocols.

Pharmacies now offer a new contraceptive service which commenced in December. Women will be able to access the pill without needing to contact their GP first. The initiative is part of the primary care access recovery plan, which is committed to making it quicker and easier for people to access healthcare on their high street.

Operation Courage

There is Mental Health information and support for veterans, service leavers, reservists, and families available across England, Op COURAGE is an NHS mental health specialist service designed to help serving personnel due to leave the military, reservists, armed forces veterans and their families. Awareness Training

Patients may note, from time to time, the Patient Participation Group organises speakers or awareness training.

Botesdale Parish Council

Report from the February 2024 **Botesdale PC Meeting**

Seven members of the Parish Council were present for the meeting, with two members of the **Street Sweeping and Path Cutting:** The PC has public. Additionally, the resignation of Councillor Stanford was acknowledged, and the Parish Council took a moment to recognize and appreciate her valuable contributions to the community.

Public Forum: A resident raised issues about a tree situated on the boundary between the Burgess Homes development and Sarah's Wood, and sought information about the transfer of ownership of the wood to the Parish Council. It was clarified that necessary work, including tree maintenance and fencing, must precede the transfer. Meanwhile, responsibility for on-site work was confirmed to lie with Burgess Homes. Another resident highlighted the issue of flooding on Back Hills, with reassurance provided that Suffolk Highways was aware of the situation.

Planning: There was one Householder Application for Old Mill House, Mill Road, The proposal for a single-storey rear extension received positive feedback, with agreement to offer no objection.

Correspondence: Several items of correspondence were discussed, including notice from MSDC of a reduction in the increase to the cost of emptying bins next year, a request for churchyard maintenance funding from the Parochial Church Council and communication from the Fairstead Trust about the current lack of a Chair. The PC has agreed to add an extra £100 to the churchyard funding, bringing the total grant to £1,000.

Recreation Ground: Details were provided following a meeting with Urban Forestry, with a draft Order for Maintenance works for the next two years. The annual value of the Order is £13,440 and is within the Draft Budget for 2024-25 as agreed by BPC at the January 2024 Meeting. There have also been a few minor issues with graffiti and dog poo, both resolved, but we would like to take this opportunity to remind you that dogs are not allowed on the Recreation Ground. Finally, we are pleased to say that the Recreation Ground has been submitted for Green Flag status.

Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (**PIIP**): The PC was happy to approve the Plan's

use as a well-written example of a PIIP in Mid "Suffolk District Council's Community Led Planning uguidance.

agreed to continue the contract with Tim Gaddis for the upcoming year, with an annual hourly rate increase in line with the state pension increase.

Internal Auditor: The appointment of Trevor Brown as the internal auditor has been approved at a cost of £400.

Review of Council Policies: The PC accepted the unamended Equal Opportunities, Health and Safety and Safeguarding Policies, along with a new Complaints Policy. These policies will be subject to review every three years and can be found on our website.

Village Assets: The Clerk reported damage to the steps leading up to the Marketplace from Back Hills and has initiated discussions with qualified firms for potential repairs.

Public Rights of Way: We are pleased to report that Suffolk County Council has repaired the steps to the boardwalk on the walk between Spring Meadows and Mill Hill and new mesh has been fixed to the surface. The holes on Bridwell Lane footpath have also been filled but this has not been successful, and we are pursuing SCC for a proper repair.

Redgrave Parish Council Report – February 2024 By Alison Spouncer, Parish Clerk

February's meeting received apologies from one Councillor and District Councillor Morgan. One member of the public was present.

Summary of County Councillor Fleming's report: County Cllr Fleming provided a report before the meeting, discussing the main points.

The Flood Recovery remains high on the agenda with seven new team members recruited. Redgrave residents were fortunately not affected. Rickinghall has seven properties affected. Cllr Fleming stated that the department is actively looking for engineers. Cllr Fleming wished to remind residents that both herself and Cllr Morgan Rickinghall Farmers' attend Market for the Councillor's Corner, and anyone is welcome to go along and meet them.

Rickinghall Parish Council

Rickinghall Parish Council Report February 2024 by Cllr Sally Smith

Rickinghall Parish Council met on Thursday 1 February with a full complement of Councillors.

The public forum was opened by Jessica Fleming, our Suffolk County Councillor, who outlined the following:

Rickinghall has qualified for engineering support from SCC following the most recent floods due to five or more residences being affected by Storm Babet. However, due to the high number of flooding cases there may now be a time lag before further progress is made. SCC will have approved their 2024/2025 budget in mid-February. Difficult decisions have been made although, with an extra £7.2m injection by the Government, some Arts Funding has been

reinstated. Progress is continuing with the new West Suffolk Hospital due to open in 2030 and archaeological assessments are currently being carried out.

Cllr Fleming still has some funds available in the Locality Budget where local community projects could benefit.

A member of the public also raised an issue regarding the way in which their Listed Building Application had been dealt with, which involved a resubmission of the application through no fault of their own and hence time lost and a further fee incurred.

Planning Applications

1 Hillside Meadow – Householder Application for conversion of existing cartlodge (first floor) to living accommodation – no objection. Bridge House, Bury Road – Householder Planning Application and Listed Building Application – Erection of single storey extension to existing kitchen (following demolition of conservatory). Installation of new external boiler – no objection.

Notice of Intent for Tree Works

5 St Georges Drive – Notification of works to trees to reduce by $1/3^{\rm rd}$ and reshape beech tree – no objection.

4 Brook Park – Notification of works to trees to dismantle No.2 Limes (T1 and T2) to ground level – no objection.

Progress Report – the Clerk outlined that the position of a new VAS sign on Bury Road going out of the village is currently being considered by SCC.

Correspondence

The annual request for funding for churchyard maintenance was agreed and it was noted that the annual cost of emptying dog and litter bins will be increased by the District Council but not by quite as much as initially thought.

General

Various Council Documents were reviewed and agreed – Health and Safety Policy, Complaints Policy and an Equal Opportunities Policy.

It was agreed to appoint an internal auditor, Trevor Brown.

A good discussion was held on flooding and ongoing issues.

It was agreed to share fees of £100 with Botesdale PC to include a 2-page article on flooding within the Parish magazine.

Cllr Rhodes has submitted the Storm Babet evidence required by the Council and the village will now wait for action. The storm drains along Bury Road are still waiting to be cleared, 3 months on from the first complaint.

For those houses affected by flooding there are grants available of up to £5,000 to provide flood protection devices. A survey must first be carried out by a registered surveyor and funding is only provided on receipt of invoices.

It was agreed to continue the contract with Tim Gaddis for street sweeping and path cutting for 2024/2025.

It was agreed to let Mid Suffolk District Council use the Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan as a good example in their Community Led Guidance.

Community Transport – discussions are on-going regarding the Community Bus and a way forward for when a new bus is required.

Notes from the Green Redgrave Group (GRG)

It has now been about 2 years since we formed the Green Redgrave Group and we are continuing on our mission to make Redgrave a Wildlife Friendly village with greater biodiversity as we go on. We plan to continue with the Biodiversity Audit and Action Plan (BAAP) that we started at the end of last year, and have agreed that we will be looking at this as an ongoing piece of work to document the state of biodiversity and see how it changes. We have so far done well with the auditing of birdlife, trees, mammals, herptiles and butterflies. We need to do more detailed work on small flora, insects and fungi. To do this we are looking to participate in a grass identification workshop together with our partner group, Green Hinderclay. We also plan to do a "bioblitz" with ecological experts of certain areas in the summer looking at all of the smaller life forms that we can find. We hope that we will be able to get children involved in some of the survey work during the We welcome input from all interested summer. residents with recordings or photos of all types of creatures such as birds and mammals, butterfly and other insect reporting. We will keep this data on the Parish Council's website at

We had the latest in our series of talks in early February. In this case we showed a film on the Intelligence of Trees and had an excellent turnout. The film showed some of the fascinating science that is now taking place to show how trees communicate, interact and aid one another and act in many ways as sentient beings. We are planning to keep up a regular programme of talks together with workshops and nature walks. We will keep those interested in these aware of our programme of events through the Green Redgrave Facebook site. But those already agreed are as follows:

2 Apr 24 – a talk by the Suffolk Owl Sanctuary

- 2 Jul 24 a talk on Dormice by Hannah Broughton
- 1 Oct 24 a talk by Jim Paine on the Secret Life of Plants

We also hope to plan a trip to Wayland Wood in May and a Fen Raft Spider walk and separate Bat walk in July. The Green Hinderclay Group is also arranging a visit to West Harling Heath.

We will be holding our AGM on Tuesday 2 Apr 24 in the All Saints Church after the talk on the Suffolk Owl Sanctuary. All welcome to attend.

Our work with the Suffolk Green Cluster (now renamed the Suffolk & Norfolk Green Cluster to reflect its growing participation) continues to thrive. We wrote up a bid to the Tree Council for 100 fruit trees which has just received funding; these will be used to form 3 new orchards in land found by the Cluster. We have also received fruit trees from the Babergh & Mid-Suffolk Biodiversity team which we planted in the Old School Playing Field to create a community orchard. Other planting activities have included the thickening up of a hedge along Searchlight Hill thanks to permission of the landowner. We also intend to plant up 10 male and one female Black Poplars on the same landowner's land shortly; this tree, once common in East Anglia, is now the most endangered native timber tree in Britain but is important to a variety of moth caterpillars. We want to play a part in its recovery.

We continue to work up our plan to improve the turtle dove plot. Our friendly landowner has agreed to help with this so as to encourage this most endangered of bird species. Hopefully work on the plot will start afresh this Spring and we can look forward to seeing a few more of these birds enjoying the fruits of our labour.

We have agreed to put aside £250 each year for bird boxes around the village and are now deciding what boxes to erect. Last year these included boxes for woodpeckers, kestrels and owls. This year we are likely to focus on the smaller passerines. We will again be using boxes made by the Street Forge Workshop in Thornham Magna. If you have not visited this admirable charity, we urge you to do so; it is well worth a visit. See <u>https://</u>

streetforgeworkshop.uk/ for details of their work.

Last year the Green Redgrave Group undertook clearance of vegetative overgrowth on the footpath along the Street on behalf of the Redgrave Parish Council. This was part of the Suffolk Highways Self-Help Scheme. We are planning to start this work again in the next month or so. Two of our number have been trained to work on the Highways and so we are formally qualified to undertake this activity, which does involve closure of one lane of traffic.

We continue to look for enthusiastic volunteers to help us progress our activities. If you want to contribute or just learn about wildlife friendly activities then please join us. Vikings - Domini Thorpe

Domini Thorpe gave a talk about the Vikings to the January meeting of the Heritage Circle at Rickinghall Village Hall which was well illustrated by artefacts that were passed around the audience.

The talk began with a review of key events in the history of the Vikings in England. The first contact was made when the Vikings attacked the monastery at Lindisfarne in 793. They killed a number of monks and stole many treasures. This began a period of raids around the coast of Britain where the Vikings spread fear by murder and pillage. Eventually, in 865 the Vikings formed the Great Heathen Army which aimed to take land from the four Anglo-Saxon kingdoms of Northumbria, East Anglia, Mercia and Wessex, so that they could settle in England. In 869 the Vikings killed King Edmund. The exact site is uncertain but it is thought to be near Thetford which became an important Viking settlement. Edmund was made a saint and remained the patron saint of England until 1350 when he was replaced by St George.

Viking expansion in England was halted by Alfred, King of Wessex, in 878. England was divided into two areas. To the north of a line roughly from London to Chester, Danelaw was established. The land to the south of this was controlled by the Anglo-Saxons. England was united into one kingdom in 954 after the defeat of the Viking King of Northumbria, Eric Bloodaxe. Unfortunately, Viking raids continued and the English king, Ethelred, was in turn replaced by the Viking Sweyn in 1013. He was succeeded by his son Canute and his grandsons until 1066 when William the Conqueror, who had Viking ancestors, established Norman rule. The Viking raids ended.

Domini Thorpe gave an insight into aspects of Viking warrior life through a variety of objects. All of these gave the impression that Viking warriors were very strong. Men wore linen tunics which were topped by a woollen shirt before putting on chain mail which weighed about 10kgs. The head was protected by an iron helmet which over time became increasingly conical in shape so as to deflect blows. A nose piece offered further protection but restricted vision. Shields were made from oak and they too were heavy. Vikings fought using a shield wall. Their main weapons were swords, daggers, axes and spears. A long axe had a shaft which documents indicate created sufficient force to cut through a rider and a horse. Spears were used for stabbing enemies and were a common weapon as they were cheap to produce as the major cost was the small iron tip.

Drinking vessels were made from animal horn which could also be flattened out to form plates. However, it is a myth that Viking helmets had horns. Antlers were used for knife handles and buckles, along with useful tools such as axes to excavate for flints.

The Vikings were a religious people and the ultimate aim of a warrior was to die in battle so that in his afterlife he could enter Valhalla and enjoy feasting. This tended to exclude women and it is possible that Christianity eventually replaced the old gods because it offered the prospect of heaven to both men and women.

The presentation reflected the detailed knowledge that Domini Thorpe has of the Viking age and her enthusiasm for participating in re-enactments.



Ivall's Notes LOHP Local News

I must have been producing these notes for over twenty years now and, as I think about it, I have an impossible job. I have over those years probably quoted the Bible verse: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life," a number of times. The reason for that is that I do not want anyone to perish yet can do very little about it. Yes, I can write a few words every month but, ultimately, it is up to each and every individual to accept or refuse God's offer for themselves. It seems to me that the choice of perishing or eternal life is such a significant one that you would expect people to think deeply about it.

Historians see the Bible as an amazing book that provides historical information over millennia. It is a mine of information for them yet I have had people ask me what information there is about Jesus that is not in the Bible. When I tell them that all the information has been collected together to form the Bible they still ask for external proof. Hugh Ross is a scientist. He says that he knew from his science that there was a 1 in 10^{80} possibility of a chance reversal of the second law of thermodynamics and that he, with the help of some sceptical friends, had calculated the chance of 13 prophecies about Jesus coming true without supernatural intervention was one in 10^{138} . That meant that the Bible was 10^{58} times more reliable than the laws of nature which he relied on every day for his existence. He had no choice but to trust the Bible's inspirer. I can quote him but it doesn't appear to make people think about the subject. I can do the sums myself. What is the chance, 700 years beforehand, of predicting Jesus's birthplace, the fact that he would have his hands and feet pierced, that he would be buried in a rich man's tomb and that they would play dice for his coat?

What I find amazing is that the Bible predicts his resurrection. Now they don't happen often. One can imagine a prediction of a resurrection from the dead and it not happen but to have the claim that 500 people saw him after his death plus a number of close up meetings with him is astounding in itself. As well as that, in the Roman Empire and with the hostility of the Jewish authorities it was risking one's life to make these claims.

Despite all this, and much more, the majority of people appear to have made up their mind to not believe with no evidence for their views. They don't seem to want to listen or even think about that subject such that I cannot but conclude that they are afraid that it might turn out that the Bible is right and that God does so love the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life.

Medieval Women

Last month I wrote about Botesdale Chapel of Ease and the inscription over the door which refers to both Juliana Shereve and Margaret Wykes.

From wills, charters and other documents it is possible to start to piece together something about them, and other women who lived at this time. Many women in medieval times ran businesses, often after their husbands had died. Women in Botesdale also had businesses, usually shops or ale houses, in and around the market place.

However Juliana Shereve did not appear to have run any business. It is possible that she may have been the daughter of Edmund Tabour who was very wealthy so she didn't have to work. He lived approximately where Street Farm stands in Botesdale today. Edmund was a wealthy man who leased 40 acres of land in Botesdale. He appears to have been a merchant, as well as a farmer, who was a friend and business acquaintance of John Baret of Bury St Edmunds and was mentioned in John's will. John was also an executor of Edmund's will. John Baret's wonderful 'cadaver' tomb stands in the South aisle of St Mary's church in Bury St Edmunds. It is well worth a visit.

Edmund died in 1447 and in his will, as well as leaving £20 for the 'edification' of the Chapel of St Edmund in Redgrave church and several other bequests, he left 100 marks to his daughter Juliana 'on condition she has behaved well towards my executors and has not married anyone without their consent.' If she disobeyed them she was to be debarred from receiving the 100 marks forever.(1) She must have been quite a feisty girl if this was put into Edmund's will! 100 marks was about £65, a great deal of money in those days.

John Shereve (Shreve or Shrive) was Juliana's second husband (not her third as I said last month). Her first husband was Peter Dasshe. The Dasshe family were an influential family who lived and worked in Botesdale. She was married to Peter by 1450, for in that year she was mentioned in the Court Rolls as Peter's wife. Peter's brother John became a priest and was Rector of North Cove in Norfolk, so the family must have been able to afford to give him a good education. Perhaps he went to the grammar school in Botesdale. Peter owned several premises or shops and probably farmed too. He died in 1468. In his will he left Juliana a house, a close, half an acre of meadow, and all his moveable goods. She also had the first right of refusal to buy the house and close that had belonged to John who had died the previous year. John had requested his lands be sold and the money used to pay a priest to pray for his soul and the souls of his mother and father for a year in St Botolph's Chapel. Peter and Juliana had two daughters, Juliana and Margery, but there is no mention of any sons.

By 1470 Juliana had married John Shereve who came from Walshamle-Willows and had land in Wattisfield. He died sometime before 1477 for in a charter from that date Juliana gave land to Margaret Wykes and her husband in which she says her husband John Shereve was dead - *I Juliana Shereve ^widow^* recently wife of John Shereve of Watlysfeld, now dead, give grant & have presented this my charter of confirmation to William Wykes of Botoluysdale and Margaret his wife ... this lends credence to the fact that Juliana was probably related to Margaret and why both were on the inscription on the chapel.(2)

By 1483 Juliana was married to her third husband Thomas Drake. She

died in 1506. Is it possible that she had been instrumental in having the chapel rebuilt as a chantry chapel following John Shereve's wishes, after his death in 1477?

Margaret and William Wykes ran The White Horse Inn which was, we think, where the 'The Greyhound' now stands. There appear to have been two Margaret Wykes. The first had been married to John Smythe junior who ran The White Horse Inn. When he died she married William Wykes senior who took over the running of the Inn. She died in 1479.(3) It is likely that this is the Margaret on the inscription. It is unlikely to be the second Margaret Wykes, as she did not die until after 1530. This later Margaret was married to William Wykes junior. When he died she married William More who in turn took on The White Horse Inn.



Botesdale Market Place with Greyhound on the Right, the Angel further up the Hill on the Left, and Street Farm in the Distance

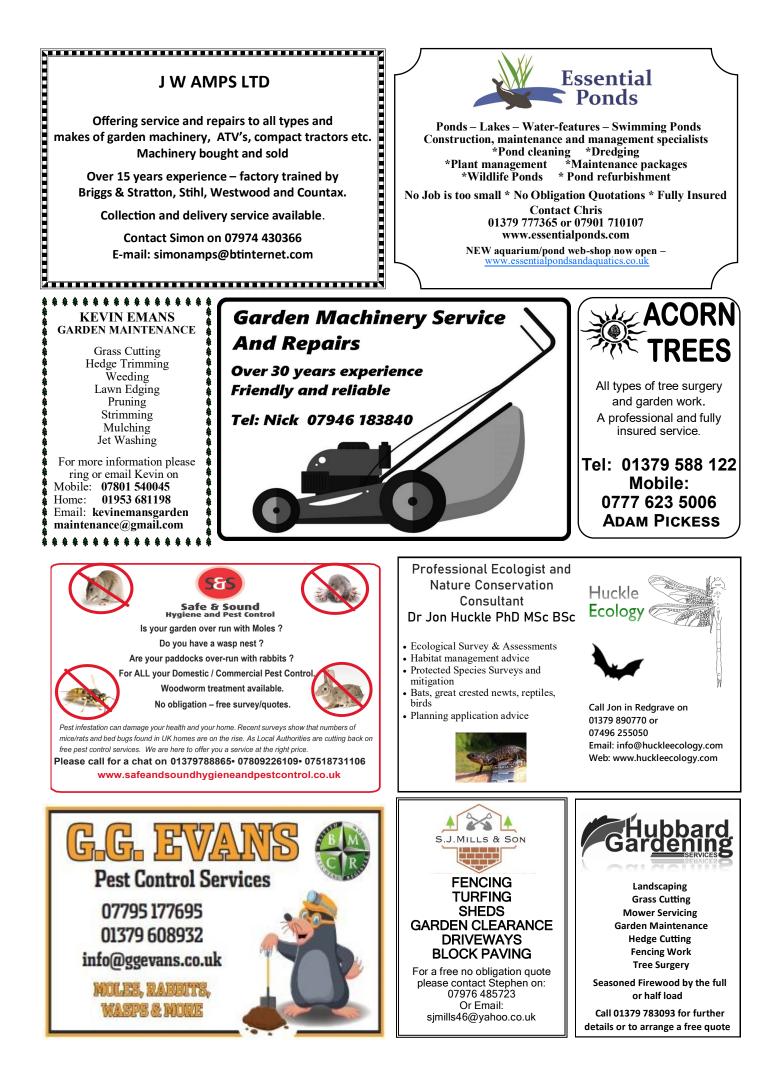
Another woman who lived and had a business at this time was Rose Crane, née Goodhous, who was the wife of Robert Crane. They had the cottage called the 'Oldetolhous' situated approximately where Angel House stands today. They rented it yearly from the lord of the manor for 4s. Robert was a baker and Rose brewed ale so it is probable that their cottage was an ale house. When a husband and wife baked bread and brewed ale in medieval times it usually meant they were in business rather than only baking and brewing for the family. Her brother was Walter Goodhous, a chaplain. So she too came from a high status family like the Dasshe and Tabour families.

When Robert died in 1423 Rose married Walter Dasshe who was probably Peter and John Dasshe's father. She still appears to have carried on with her business, as in the 1433 Botesdale Extent she was still called Rose Crane even though by then she was married to Walter.

As can be seen, medieval women such as Juliana, Margaret and Rose, when left widowed, often married again very quickly especially if they were wealthy, had land or a profitable business.

Our speaker for our February meeting had to withdraw at the last minute due to illness. Undeterred we had an interesting and fun evening and were pleased to welcome some new faces to our meeting. Our own Rosemary Shurmer stood in at very short notice giving us a very interesting talk about her visits to Western Australia where her daughter and family live (she and her husband also have a son and family who live in Queensland, which is over 3,000 miles away) so has visited and travelled across Australia a number of times.

Rosemary told us that although Western Australia is large, a lot of it is desert and the majority of the 3.3 million people live on the coast around Perth, overlooking a beautiful park and with lovely beaches. The population is now multi-cultural and due to the gold mining inland is a wealthy region of Australia with a lovely sunny climate. A large part of Western Australia is desert with strange rock formations. Her favourite place is a small island a ferry ride from Perth which in the 1800s was a penal colony and in the 2 world wars was a prisoner of war camp, which has now been turned into an expensive holiday resort, even though the accommodation is basic. There are no cars on the island, just buses and utility vans so it is like going back in time.

Australia is noted for some dangers around all starting with \mathbf{S} – scorpions, snakes (on land), stingers and sharks in the ocean but Rosemary has only had to watch out for sunburn and sunstroke!

Rosemary's talk was followed by a fun quiz which Sara Schofield ran with questions from different decades from the 1950s up to the 2000s.

citizens advice Mid Suffolk

Damp and mould is building up in our house as the weather gets colder. Our living room is the worst and there's a strong smell, so

we've stopped having friends round. We're also concerned about our health. We've reported it to our landlord, but they haven't done anything. With six months left on the tenancy agreement, we're running out of options. What should we do?

You've done the right thing by bringing this to your landlord. To work out if they are responsible, you'll need to find the cause of the damp and mould. This can take time unless there's a clear cause, like bad insulation or a leaking roof.

Damp is when an area of your property doesn't dry out, often because it's cold. The main types are rising, penetrating, construction, and condensation damp. It can lead to mould, which is a fungus that grows in areas where warm damp air condenses on cold surfaces, like window frames. Information on our website can help you work out what type of damp you have, who is responsible and what you can do. Go to citizensadvice.org.uk and search damp for more information.

You should check your tenancy agreement for mentions of repairs and damp. Your landlord is responsible for fixing a damp problem if it's making your home unsafe to live in. For example, this could be if it's affecting your health or the health of those you live with. Your landlord will also be responsible if the damp is related to repairs they should have carried out, like if the window frames are rotting.

Condensation is a key cause of damp we're all familiar with. You should try and reduce extra moisture in your home, this will make it easier to show that your landlord is responsible for the damp. Extra moisture can come from portable gas or paraffin heaters, drying wet clothes or using a tumble dryer with no outside vent.

You may reach the point where you just want to get out of your tenancy agreement early, but remember this can be tricky and there might be things you haven't tried yet.

For example, you could get support from Safe Suffolk Renters, a Suffolk wide project to help improve relationships between landlords and private tenants. Contact them via their website safesuffolkrenters.org. As a private renter, if you've got evidence from a health professional that damp is making you ill, you may be able to get free legal advice through Legal Aid. Citizens Advice Mid Suffolk can provide in depth advice on this issue and much more, including debt, finances, employment, benefits and family/ relationships. SCAM ALERT

FAKE TEXT MESSAGES CLAIMING TO BE FROM ROYAL MAIL

Text messages continue to circulate purportedly from the Royal Mail stating 'we regret to inform you we are unable to deliver your parcel due to part missing address' they then instruct you to click online to corroborate your details to secure prompt delivery.

This text is another example of criminals creating spoof messages that link to fake websites using official looking logos and branding of trusted organisations designed to trick you into urgent action to reveal financial details without closer inspection.

<u>ALWAYS</u> be very wary of unexpected messages being received out of the blue and <u>NEVER</u> click on any offered links or attachments unless you are completely sure you can trust them.

<u>REMEMBER</u>

Suspicious text messages can be reported by forwarding the message to 7726

If you have interacted with a scam message and provided your personal financial details, contact your bank immediately on a number you know to be genuine (on back of bank card)

FAKE HEALTH LOTTERY WINNING LETTERS

Trading Standards are also warning about letters being received locally claiming the recipient has won a substantial prize in the Health Lottery.

These unfortunately are scam letters, deceptively addressed to you by name including a bogus 'winning ticket 'number. The letter gives a telephone number to call to claim your prize. Calling the number will lead to a phone scam to obtain your personal financial details so your winnings can be credited to your bank account.

Additional pressure will also be applied saying you need to act immediately as the claims deadline is fast approaching risking your prize being cancelled as 'unclaimed'.

The Health Lottery do not send letters to winners. So bin any such letters and don't call the requested number. Send any suspected scam letters to the Royal Mail via FREEPOST SCAM MAIL.


