

The other day I had a letter from the Scripture Union, which is an international, inter-denominational, evangelical Christian movement working in partnership with individuals and churches to encourage the use of the Bible to inspire children, young people and adults to know God in a better and more meaningful way. In this letter they were explaining how many children have no idea what Christmas is about. Their examples included: a 7 year old boy who thought that Jesus was born at either 10 Downing Street or Buckingham Palace and that he didn't know whose birthday we celebrate on Christmas Day; a 10 year old girl who believes that Prince Charles was one of the Wise Men and that the birth of Jesus was announced via Facebook. It appears that many people are growing up thinking that the only thing Christmas is about is a shopping spree, must-have presents and family feasts, or, even worse, a time when families argue or feel ashamed that they can't afford the excesses of their neighbours. So what is Christmas all about?

Well the true meaning of Christmas is love. John 3:16-17 says, "For God so loved the world that he gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." The true meaning of Christmas is the celebration of this incredible act of love. In essence it is a love story.

The real Christmas story is the story of God becoming a human being in the person of Jesus Christ. Why did God do such a thing? Because He loves us! Why was Christmas necessary? Because we needed a Saviour! Why does God love us so much? Because He is love itself (*1 John 4:8*). Why do we celebrate Christmas each year? Out of gratitude for what God did for us, we remember Jesus' birth by giving each other gifts, worshipping Him, and being especially conscious of the poor and less fortunate.

The true meaning of Christmas is love. God loved His own and provided a way—the only Way—for us to spend eternity with Him. He gave His only Son to take our punishment for our sins. He paid the price in full, and we are free from condemnation when we accept that free gift of love. "But God demonstrated His own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

As part of celebrating Christmas many Christian Churches also observe the season of Advent. This is a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus at Bethlehem. It covers a period of four Sundays before Christmas Day starting on a date between November 27th and December 3rd inclusive. This time is not only used for the preparation of the birth of Jesus Christ, but also to think about and prepare for His second coming, for the Bible tells us that Jesus will one day, in simplest terms, return to earth and take all who believe in Him to heaven.

Many churches have an Advent wreath, a circle of evergreen branches laid flat to symbolize eternal life. Four candles (not fork handles!) stand in the circle and each one represents one of the four Sundays of Advent. In the centre of the circle is a fifth candle the Christ Candle, which is lit on Christmas Day. The wreath reminds Christians

of God, His eternity and endless mercy, which has no beginning or end and the green of the wreath speaks of the hope that Christians have in God, the hope of newness, of renewal, of eternal life.

The Advent candles have symbolism as each Sunday in Advent traditionally has a theme, but the overriding symbolism is that they symbolise the light of God coming into the world through the birth of His son, Jesus.

The first candle is traditionally known as The Candle of Hope. Hope is like a light shining in a dark place. The light of this candle celebrates the hope that Christians have in Jesus Christ.

The second candle represents the Old Testament prophets and is known as The Candle of Peace. Peace is like a light shining in a dark place so the light of this candle celebrates the peace we find in Jesus Christ.

The third candle reminds us of John the Baptist, and is often known as The Candle of Love. Love is like a candle shining in a dark place, so we celebrate the love we have in Christ.

The fourth candle is for Mary the mother of Jesus, and is known as The Candle of Joy. Joy is like a light shining in a dark place and reminds us that our joy is complete in Jesus Christ.

And finally the fifth candle represents the birth of Christ. The flame of which reminds us that He is The Light of the World and that if we follow Him, we will never walk in darkness, but will have the true light of life.

So as we all prepare for Christmas, let us not forget the true meaning of Christmas, that we are celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ, God's only Son, the Light of the World, so that we can know the full extent of God's love for us.

May you experience the love and joy of Christ as you celebrate Christmas.

With every blessing for the Christmas season and for a prosperous New Year.

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Report for the Meeting held on Monday 11th November The Parish Council Meeting was attended by 5 councillors, with apologies for absence having been received from Cllrs Appleby and Burgess. The PC was very pleased to welcome John Abraham to the Council, to fill a casual vacancy. This means that there is now just one vacancy on the Parish Council. Please contact the Clerk for more details or to put your name forward.

Public Forum: District Councillor Sara Michell reported that more petitions had been presented to Government concerning the disparity in funding to rural areas compared to urban areas, with 50% more funding received per capita in urban areas. Government has pledged to consider the issue.

Budget 2014/15: The PC set a budget of £19,710 for next year. This is a rise of 12.4% but in reality means only £0.60 extra per month on Band D Council Tax. The PC has had to add a significant amount to its budget to pay for the replacement of aging parish-owned street lights following a maintenance inventory by Suffolk County Council. Two lights will be replaced before the end of the current financial year, with another three to be taken care of in 2014/15. That will leave another 12 lights which will need to be replaced from 2015.

Winter Grit Provision: Grit will be provided in the same locations this year to be used on public property, e.g. footways. We receive a limited supply from the County Council so the PC would ask that you please don't take the grit for use on private property.

Footpaths and Streams: The Maintenance of Footpaths and Streams project has started work again. Anyone interested in joining the work party can contact Cllr Chris Lambert on 01379 897053 or via email at chris@prewarminor.com

It was a tough decision and we wish we had the space to display all of the drawings.

The Lights On event will be held on Saturday 7th December this year at 6.15pm.

In recent years the tree has become a focus for the festive season. It has been almost totally funded by Botesdale Parish Council and costs the parish in the region of £750 per annum, this at a time when the council's resources are being increasingly stretched by the effects of budget cuts and increases in the cost of services. In the past residents have given generously towards the Christmas Tree fund at the Soap Box Derby but this is no longer an option. We are therefore seeking support from the community. Any contributions to our Christmas tree fund, no matter how large or small, will be welcomed and formally acknowledged. Thank you for your support!

Report of the Meeting held on Wednesday 13th November On the first really frosty night we were pleased that there is a fast acting heating system!

Two councillors were unable to attend but the public numbers were much the same as usual.

Jim McCluskey advised that it would be his last meeting and he was thanked by all for his fine contribution over the past 8 years. This will leave a vacancy for one councillor to be co-opted. Please could anyone who would like to join us as a councillor contact Jason Walker on 01379 898 696.

County Councillor Jessica Fleming informed us that Highways would shortly be making road works information and timing for filling potholes available on the internet for access by anyone. Details will be advised.

District Councillor Sara Michell was unable to attend but sent a note that the Rural Services Network found that people pay higher council tax in rural areas and yet receive substantially less support for public services. The government's funding formula for local authorities means urban councils currently receive around 50% more money per person than rural councils. Rural communities are getting a raw deal from government. More than 100 petitions calling for fairer funding (including ours from Mid Suffolk) have been presented by MPs to the government. David Ruffley has highlighted the issue in the House of Commons. This week the government has pledged to listen to rural concerns and meet with campaigners and the Rural Service Network over the unfairness and disparity in the funding issue. The comment from councillors was "don't hold our breath".

Planning was relatively quiet with just the time limit for the dwelling adjacent to Timbers being extended and listed building consent being given to Priory Barn.

The budget was set for 2014/2015 but the major part of the discussion was in trying to understand the information from meetings at Mid Suffolk on how the precept would work in future.

The precept is the amount the parish council requires to do its work and which is a small part of the council tax paid by us all. At the moment for a middle of the range household the Redgrave Parish Council part of council tax is £29 per year. Redgrave Parish Council requires a total of £7,500 per year to act on behalf of the residents. That has remained unchanged for 11 years due to the efficiencies achieved over that time. Due to changes imposed by central government, although the £7,500 remains unchanged, a resident will probably see the Redgrave part of the council tax increase by £3 per year from £29 per year to £32 per year. We will wait until February to finalise what we request from Mid Suffolk for our precept as our view is that neither local or central government seems to have any clue what is happening on this subject. If any resident would like to come and hear the final outcome they are most welcome, as always, to attend our next parish council meeting on 8 January 2014.

Thanks to Suffolk County Council for replacing the footbridge on the footpath from Bier Lane to Moneypot.

There still appears to be unusual noise disturbance from Gressingham foods so John Giddings and Jim McCluskey will meet with them to consider the situation.

There is no meeting in December.

* "In Your Garden" 💥 We have had a late autumn with no notable frost until the second week of November, which in turn helps the process of turning leaf 💥 colour. It has been particularly wet though, and heavier plots will be harder to turn. December though, can be one of our driest months of the year, albeit with a risk of snow. Lawns can be aerated when not frosty, and this will aid root growth and reduce the incidence of moss, which likes poor drainage as well as shade. If your lawn has such a troublesome corner, why not give it a re-shape, reducing its area, creating a feature, or introduce shade-loving plants. Generally, plants with broader leaves (e.g. Hostas, Aucubas, Bergenias) tolerate the most shade, the theory being that they have more area for absorbing the sunlight.

🕻 Seeing Fuchsias and Geraniums still in flower in mid-November reminded me of a competition run by the Cottage Garden Society, in 🏌 which they asked gardeners to record every plant in flower in their garden on Christmas Day. Whilst there were plenty of what you'd expect, i.e. Jasmine, Snowdrops, Viburnums, there were also some surprises like Roses and Rosemary. The point was though, that it 7 is possible to choose plants for your garden which ensure flowers of one kind or another, all year round. What a nice new year's resolution! resolution!

Tasks for this month include important protection work; reduce the chance of your pond completely icing over by floating a small Tasks for this month include important protection work, reduce the chance of your point comparison of the plastic ball or two; check that greenhouses and sheds are fully repaired and reasonably wind-tight. Is glass in good order, and roof felt well secured? Young trees may need staking and tender plants and pots can be covered with woven fabric or bubble-wrap. You are really protecting against two things, frost and wind burn, but the effect of the wind is worse when the ground is frozen.

ASK THE CHEF

Q : We have family coming to visit and they love to eat fish, do you have any healthy salmon recipes I could use please?

A: Salmon is a lovely fish to cook, this dish is not only easy to make but the salmon is cooked using a griddle pan making it a healthy meal - enjoy!

Grilled Salmon with Lime & Chilli Butter

Ingredients

tbsp olive oil
 salmon fillets
 knob of butter
 spring onions, finely sliced
 large red chilli, halved, deseeded and finely chopped
 zest and juice of 1 lime
 small bunch coriander, chopped

Method

1. Heat the oil in a griddle (or a large frying pan) and cook the salmon, skin side down, for approx 5-6 minutes until the skin is crispy and golden, then turn the salmon fillets – go carefully, and cook for a further 2 mins. Remove the salmon from the pan and set to one side.

2. Place the butter in the pan until melted, add the spring onions, chilli and lime zest and let sizzle in the butter for 2 minutes, then add the lime juice. Using a spoon pour the chilli and lime butter over the salmon. Scatter with the coriander and serve with boiled rice.

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Our 7th November meeting was attended by four councillors, with apologies from Councillors Smith and Clarke. We were also pleased to welcome David Lister to the Council, to fill a casual vacancy.

On opening the meeting to the public forum, our County Councillor Jessica Fleming briefly commented on the recent Ofsted report on Suffolk schools, and advised that most of the comments were directed at Ipswich, with the rural schools performing better. She also advised that a request for funds had been put in to the community budget at Suffolk County Council to provide a grant for hedging for the allotments. Representatives had attended our last meeting to try to secure funding for this project, and we had suggested that this may be a suitable source.

Peter Beck, the Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator, fortunately had no crime to report this month. He advised that the No Cold Caller Zone had now been set up in Church Meadow, and the elements involved explained to residents.

Also in the public forum, the owners of 36 Church Meadow briefly spoke in relation to their planning application.

Planning Applications this month were limited to the continued use of outbuildings at 36 Church Meadow in connection with their business, and a single tree to be felled in Brook Park – both were approved. We also had notification that an extension and internal alterations to Sunnydale House, The Street had been passed by MSDC.

The clerk had a meeting with John Simpson from Suffolk County Council Highways Department, regarding the double yellow lines on The Street adjacent to the Co-op entrance. We have expressed

The next three books in the series will be available shortly : A Walk Through Rickinghall by Diana Maywhort Reflections on Redgrave, Part 1 by Jean Sheehan and Victorian & Edwardian Rectors by Sarah Doig concerns in the past about the very poor visibility on exiting the Coop, and are aware there have been a few near misses. It now seems the extent of the lines may have been wrongly executed in the past, and we were advised that in the next financial year - ending April 2015 – there are plans for the Council to resurface the road through the village, with an accompanying review of the signs and road markings. The lines should get 'sorted out' at that point.

We discussed the budget for 2014/15 and agreed the precept which should only add 97p per annum to the average Band D Council Tax bill. We agreed to support a grant of £600 to the PCC for churchyard maintenance, the same sum as last year, and we are trialling a table in the Village Hall for the next three months at the Farmers Market. This is to provide a presence in the village where a councillor will be available for you to discuss any queries or issues you wish to raise – do look out for them when you next visit the market.

At our next meeting we will revisit the subject of setting up a CIC (Community Interest Company) for the villages. This was discussed earlier in the year, and details sent out to 'test the water' with no reaction. Our chairman is eager to look at the project again, which would aim to achieve benefits for the community. These could encompass renewable energy, the internet, local transport, or whatever was needed. Perhaps we are all 'happy with our lot' here in Rickinghall. Is there a need for a CIC? What do you think ? Do let us know!
