



Exploring the Past

Redgrave Hall built by Nicholas Bacon 1545 – 1554 (Part 3)

Continuing my last two articles about the building of Redgrave Hall by Nicholas Bacon, a few of the most important artisans were the masons.

The account book mentions rough masons and free masons. Ernest R. Sandeen, MA, PHD, also used the account book for his dissertation at the University of Chicago. He summarised all the figures into groups of artisans and trades and the amounts paid to them in individual years. The ruins of the Tudor house were still standing at the time Ernest Sandeen wrote the article, which he visited and measured. The rough masons started work in 1546, they were probably the bricklayers, and entries in the accounts continue until 1554. The total amount paid to them over this period amounted to £103 15s 31/2d. They began work on the 9th March and were paid twenty shillings in hand. (£1) They were paid a further six shillings on Maundy Thursday and another £6 6s 8d on Estereven. Their individual wages ranged between eight pence and ten pence a day, with the labourers paid at six pence (21/2 new pence) a day. The labourers probably carried the bricks for the skilled bricklayers. The bricklayers, Gye and Bennett came from London and were employed for six weeks in 1551. One man, Wellyng, was paid in full for laying twenty three thousand bricks at two shillings the thousand when he had finished the walls and towers. I am not aware of any towers in the house, although there was a small turret in the roof above the front door, and a stair turret at the back. It could be the earlier red brick tower at Redgrave Church although it does not say this, but the amounts do include carpentry carried out at the church. A sum of nine shillings and sixpence was allowed for the workers as part of their wages, for two whole barrels and six gallons of beer for 1552. A barrel contained thirty six gallons.

The freemasons started work on the stone in 1547 and they came from Ipswich through Mr Withypool, the architect, who designed Christchurch Mansion, Ipswich, which was built between 1548 and 1550. The design of Redgrave Hall was virtually the same as Christchurch Mansion. The central doorway leading into the screens passage at Redgrave was made of stone with a typical flattened Tudor arch and quatrefoils in the spandrels. This doorway with the tablet above it remained as the doorway to the kitchen when the house was redesigned by Capability Brown for Rowland Holt and completed in 1770. The stone tablet above the door was known as an emblem and this one depicted a hand protruding from clouds holding a square and a compass, freemasons' tools. Beneath this is a ribbon incised with Bacon's motto in Latin 'Mediocria Firma', which means 'Safety in Moderation'. Sandeen believes that the hand represented the hand of God measuring out a modest span of time and fortune. This tablet was made before Bacon was knighted in 1558 after which it would probably have had his armorial bearings incised instead. (1) When the remains of the Tudor Hall were demolished in the 1970s the tablet was given back to Peter Holt-Wilson who eventually donated it to the Bacon family. The tablet was restored by Mr Sandy of Roydon in the 1990s and was placed over the doorway of Raveningham Hall, the home of Sir. Nicholas Bacon, the Premier Baronet of England.

Redgrave Hall was designed by John Gybbon who was paid twenty shillings in 1545 for the platt (plan).(2) This plan cannot be found but it was probably just a floor plan, with no elevations shown and was probably adapted during building by Nicholas Bacon and the artisans. John Gybbon lived on the South Bank in St. Saviour's Parish in London. (St. Saviour's is Southwark Cathedral). He was paid 3s 8d a week as a setter at Westminster Hall, working for the king. During the first six years of work at Redgrave Hall he was paid £8 10s 0d as Master Mason.



Exploring the Past Again

Rectory Hill to Church Lane

For much of the 20th century the house now called Breklaw was a shop called The Corner Shop. At one time a Mrs Davey ran it. The Marshall family had a grocers and drapers shop there in the 1950s. It finally closed as a shop in the early 2000s.

Turning into Rectory Hill the first house on the right is Hanby. The deeds of this cottage go back to the late 17th century when Francis Symonds, a linen weaver, left two properties here and in Water Lane to his wife and mother-in-law.

The houses on both sides at the top of the hill were built as council houses just after the Second World War by Mr Goddard who employed many soldiers returning from active and National service. Today the houses are mostly privately owned.

St Mary's Rickinghall Superior church dates from the 14th century, however the nave was rebuilt in the 15th century. The south porch with an upper chamber or parvise was added at this time as was the parapet on the tower. The stairs to the parvise and the stairs to the rood loft are still in place. The stone seat running right around the inner wall of the nave was for the elderly and infirm as medieval churches did not have pews. The south west window in the chancel commemorates Samuel Spear, a village boy who, at the age of 15, went out to East Africa as a missionary. He died at the age of 20 in Lincolnshire where he was being prepared to be ordained. (1)

An unusual feature is a mason's mark that can be seen at the base of the outside of the tower. There are six bells which are still rung by a group of bell ringers on Saturday mornings. An agreement exists from 1712 between John Goldsmith of Redgrave, a bell founder, and Churchwardens Michael Barnes and Henry Elmy of Rickinghall Superior to make five new bells. (2) Henry Elmy is buried in a table tomb grave in the churchyard on the north side of the church.

Beside the porch on the west side is an area where there was once a small Lady Chapel or Chantry Chapel. This was excavated in the 1950s by Basil Brown. The Will of Thomas Hervey dated 31 January 1476 requests that he be 'buried in the Chapel of St Mary annexed to the church of Rickinghall Superior'. It is not known when this chapel was demolished or why. The church was declared redundant in 1977 and is now in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust.

The Enclosure Map for 1818 shows a 'camping close' behind the church running parallel with the present bypass. Camping or camp ball was a game something like football dating from the medieval period. It was played by any number of participants. It could get very rough. It was often played between villages as cricket is today.

Opposite the church, on the north corner of Church Lane where it meets the Finningham Road, is the site where it is thought the medieval gildhall once stood. There were three gilds in Rickinghall Inferior and Superior: St John the Baptist, St. Peter and St Mary. These were not craft gilds but social gilds, more like friendly societies. A building which was possibly the old gildhall is visible on the 1818 Enclosure Map but there is no sign of it today.

The listing for Suggenhall Farm, in Church Lane, says it is a 17th century house which was extended in the 19th century. However the

first reference to 'Sugenhale' that has been found is in a survey from 1437 when Richard Coupere and his wife Beatrix farmed the land. The Tiptott family appear to have held it for over a century from approximately the 1540s until at least 1656. (3) Then Thomas Fitling leased it for several years. An indenture from 1673 survives naming him as the occupier. In the Hearth Tax of 1674 he is noted as having 5 hearths so it must have been a large house. From about 1841 until 1911 the Newstead family were tenant farmers here. In 1919 the Brown family bought it and members of the family have owned it ever since. Suggenhall barn was converted into a dwelling in 2005.

It is thought that Suggenhall could be the site of Crows Hall Manor, held by John and Mary Crow which is referred to in documents from the late 1200s. They also held the manor in Crowfield and Crows Hall in Debenham.

Church Lane turns right into Potters Lane and Potters Farm is on the right. In the early 1800s this was owned but not occupied by James Hamblin Smith. It was sold with his other properties after his death in 1850. A sales document from that date describes the farm as having a tiled cottage, barn, stable, cart lodges and shelter sheds along with 76 acres of arable and pasture land.

Just beyond Potters Farm is a wooded area where a Second World War observation post stood. There is anecdotal evidence that in the 19th century a cottage on the site was used as a pest house or isolation house. In 1943 the land was let to the Air Ministry and the Observation Post was built. The post was manned 24 hours a day by local residents, among them Basil Brown. In 1956 an underground monitoring post was built. It was used until 1968 when the site was returned to Rickinghall Parish Council. The underground chamber has now been sealed, the brick tower demolished and an information board placed on the site. (4)





Some years ago a minister of a church told me that his Sunday School Superintendant had come to him and confessed to abusing the children. At the time he didn't know what to do and started asking the parents who, it turned out, wanted it covered up. I wonder how the conversation would go if someone came to me with the confession. I am not someone who is easily shocked and would have paused before saying, "I appreciate you telling me and I wish to do everything I can to support you and your family through this but you do realise that the law compels me to go to the police."

I imagine he might reply, "I came to you as a friend. Where is the forgiveness that you are always talking about?"

"You haven't done anything against me unless you include the damage this is going to do to the church. I am willing to forgive that. I hope that having taught forgiveness the parents will do the same. The law is still that I have to tell the police."

"But you are always quoting, 'if we confess our sins he is faithful and just to forgive us.' You also say that we are to forgive in the same way as Christ forgives us."

"I know and I will do my best to do so. I will do everything I can to be your friend through this. If you will go to the police yourself I will come with you. I'll do everything I can but the law knows nothing of forgiveness."

I can't know whether he would understand as I believe a lot of people would expect forgiveness to include forgetting the offence and ignoring the consequences. In truth, in going as far as to stand by my friend, I would be taking some considerable risk in that I could well get labelled with his misdemeanours. There are many interesting points for discussion that come out of this illustration but the phrase, 'the law knows nothing of forgiveness' is significant in explaining Christianity. There is a close parallel between the above example and why Jesus died.

God created the law which we know as the Ten Commandments and includes many more rules that we have largely forgotten. God then said:

"I have set before you today life and good, death and evil. If you obey the commandments of the LORD your God that I command you today, by loving the LORD your God, by walking in his ways, and by keeping his commandments and his statutes and his rules, then you shall live and multiply, and the LORD your God will bless you..."

The law knows nothing of forgiveness and the consequences of breaking the law must be taken. It doesn't matter how repentant my friend was the law must have its way.

In Christianity Jesus takes the consequences of the law for me. The law knows nothing of forgiveness, that is why Jesus had to die. He said, "I come not to destroy the law but to fulfil it. Not one jot or tittle of the law will pass away until all is accomplished." He accomplished that when he died on the cross. Paul was thus able to say "He is our peace,, he has abolished in his flesh the law of commandments and ordinances, that he might reconcile us to God through the cross." For the Christian the law now has no power to condemn.

I am delighted to report that after the misery of a cold so-called Spring the warmer weather DID arrive and, with it, the return of our migratory birds.

I am sure you will have earlier reports than mine, but I saw my first Swallow in Botesdale on 16th April. The Cuckoo was heard on Redgrave Fen on 17th April, and then later on Thelnetham Fen on 28th April. The



Chiff Chaff appeared in the middle of **A Red Kite in flight** April and later the Willow Warbler. They

have the same appearance but a totally different song.

Swifts was seen flying high over our house on 6th May. I was asked "where have all our Swifts gone?" I think a few look in to see that their prospective "patch" is still available and then fly locally, or maybe many miles away, to a good feeding area, before returning with a mate to nest. As with all our migratory birds, the flight must be exhausting and it is necessary to have a good feed to replenish their body reserves. Incidentally, I received a report on 13th May of a flight of two to three hundred Swifts flying over Botesdale in a north westerly direction.

I, personally, was spoiled for a Spring bird watch by a trip to the North Norfolk coast in mid April. The reserve at Cley was in bright sunlight and I was welcomed by a Peregrine flying overhead. Next, from one of the hides, two Marsh Harriers were seen "mobbing" a Kite. The area was full of Avocets and various duck, not forgetting the many waders that were passing through, the most attractive being the Black Tailed Godwit, the male being resplendent in his bright rufus spring clothing.

A visit to neighbouring Titchwell Reserve was equally rewarding, being welcomed by still present Bramblings and Siskins at the feeding areas. Below them wandered nonchalantly a Water Rail helping himself to the pickings dropping from the feeders. The Water Rail is an attractive water bird similar to the Moorhen, but more reserved and seldom seen, with a finer plumage—a dark blue sheen body and a delicate red bill and pinkish legs. It's so-called song consists of pig like grunts and squeaks.

I have had a short visit to neighbouring Lackford Lakes, hopefully for the Nightingale. It was there in early song, rehearsing only, I thought. As yet no Turtle Doves. I must return for this is where I usually hear and see this now rare dove.

All this information about more distant reserves, but how about our local Redgrave Fen? On 6th May, looking for our Spring visiting raptor, the Hobby, I saw a female Marsh Harrier on Little Fen. Later, three Hobbies did arrive. The Hobby is a small and fast flying raptor, very agile and, from a distance, resembling a Swift. It is greyish in colour with an attractive dark red chest. When Hobbies arrive they often come together in areas with a good food supply. Recent reports this year are of up to twenty four at Lakenheath RSPB Reserve. In flight they catch flying insects in their talons before transferring them to their beaks. Like Swifts they perform aerobatics in order to catch their prey.

A little memory with which to finish. Once, some years ago whilst caravanning on the East Suffolk coast, my sleep was pleasantly interrupted throughout the night by a Nightingale. This was nothing to the experience of a friend camping on the Dingle Marsh at Walberswick, who got fed up with the constant 'booming' of Bitterns!

*************** "In Your Garden"

with Ian Shilling of Tripp Batt Country Store of Stanton

Lettuces, Cut-and-come-again crops, Rocket, Radishes, Carrots and Beetroot are just some of the vegetables which can be sown in June to keep the fresh produce coming. Fresh herbs add great flavours to the kitchen, and many of these can be sown now for future use. Parsley, Dill, Basil and Coriander all come easily from seed, sown outdoors in a sunny spot. However, experience tells me that the nearer they are to the kitchen door, the more they'll be used! Keep up your vigilance regarding pests and diseases, particularly as soft fruit starts to ripen, as early capture is the key. Get in quick with protection methods such as netting for soft fruit, and spray at early signs of attack on greenhouse crops such as tomatoes, cucumbers and courgettes. Also consider the unpredictability of drought conditions and remember the importance of mulching - a great technique for retaining moisture in the ground and in pots. Even grass clippings can be used as long as the layers are not too thick.

Also protect your Strawberries from rain splashes using straw or mulch material which will also help keep the ground moist for fuller fruits. After fruiting, Strawberries will send out runners, which can be pegged down to produce new plants.

If you still have too many developing apples, they can be thinned after the natural 'June drop'. Picking off miss-shapen or underdeveloped fruits will mean that energy is diverted into the fewer fruits producing larger ones. Gooseberries can also be thinned like this, leaving the larger ones to develop. The ones you pick off can still be used in cooking.

The late but welcome burst of spring has seen herbaceous plants shooting up, but many of these are prone to getting blown over in the wind. The secret is to offer support now rather than wait until the plants are higher. This can be in the form of twigs, canes or metal supports, for the plants to grow through. The plants will then camouflage the less attractive means of support.

MASS IN G MINOR

The first mass I wrote was performed in Redgrave Church in December 2007 shortly before Christmas. The newly appointed Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, the very Rev Nigel Stock, was the guest of honour. He wrote to me in his own hand the next day and I shall treasure the letter to the end of my days. There is a good deal of truth in the lyrics of W. S. Gilbert in the operetta 'Ruddigore' concerning self advertisement, they are:

'If you wish in the world to advance Your merits you're bound to advance You must stir it and stump it And blow your own trumpet Or trust me you haven't a chance'

Forgive me therefore for quoting from his letter.

"Congratulations on a wonderful achievement. You assembled an excellent choir, orchestra and group of soloists and brought the best out of them. However apart from that there was the extraordinary feat of writing and producing the work itself. It was quite clear that your audience was captivated and I do hope you yourself had a real sense of fulfillment. It was tremendous to be at a performance where it was so obvious that the composer not only cared deeply for the use of Latin as a medium for singing but for what the words conveyed......."

My second mass was performed in Redgrave Church in 2010 and now the first performance of my third mass will take place on Sunday July 14th at 6.30 pm, again in Redgrave Church.

I have engaged a young concert pianist, Matthew McCombie, to play and he will be accompanied by top cellist Catherine Johnson. Matthew left the Royal College of Music a year or so ago and currently spends much of his time giving concerts on cruise ships. I discovered him through Sue and Edward Coales who much enjoyed his playing when they were on a cruise recently. Catherine lives in Cambridge and teaches the cello as well as giving recitals. The solo singers are Pam Vinten Phipps, Jennifer Hewes, Joseph Morgan, Owain Browne and Paul Hewes. The concert will last an hour followed by refreshments.

Originally music for the mass was intended to be sung at the appropriate places in the communion service. As time went by the music developed to such an extent that it became suitable for concert performance not necessarily always in a church. For a composer the task of writing a mass is made simpler because the sections are clearly defined and each one has its own emotional quality. The main sections are: Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Benedictus and Agnus Dei. The words translated from the Latin may be seen in the Book of Common Prayer. For me the masses of Haydn and Mozart are among my most favourite of all musical compositions, far from being 'heavy going' they abound with lively exciting music and are full of melodies. Well known masses include Verdi's 'Requiem', Haydn's Nelson Mass, Bach's B minor, Beethoven's Missa solemnis, Mozart's 'Coronation' and his famous 'Requiem'.

I hope that July 14th will be a pleasant summer evening. From the beautiful Redgrave Church will be heard for the first time music for the new mass. I can guarantee plenty of attractive tunes as well as suitably serious ones.






